#### FIRE OFFICIALS IN 8 COUNTIES ASKED TO MEET

Representatives from Voulnteer Outfits Will Gather at Cresson April 18th.

Fire chiefs and representatives of volunteer fire companies from eight Pennsylvania counties have been invited to meet with Chief John A. Morann of the Johnstown Fire Department at a technical conference in Cresson on April 18.

The Cresson conference has been called at the request of the State Department of Public Instruction's newly - organized Public Service Inmeetings which will be held conducted simultaneously throughout the

Cresson was selected for the conin the eight-county district. Chief Moran said he had conferred with Chief Robert J. Kenny of the Cresson Fire Department and had been assueed that a suitable meeting place for the conference would be available.

Principal purpose of the conference will be to obtain advice and counsel to guide the Institute in mapping out its program for providing training schools for firemen throughout Pennsylvania.

In his invitation to representatives of the various fire departments in this district he explained that the Cresson meeting will be a forerunner to the one-week firemen's training conferences which will be held at one of the colleges in the state this summer.

The Public Service Institute and the Firemen's Association of Pennsylvania will cooperate in staging the summer conference that will include training sections for chiefs, mechanics, engin-

eers and regular firemen.

There also will be special courses designed for prospective teachers of firemen's training classes that are expected to be conducted in all counties of the state next winter. Such courses already have been inaugurated in a half-dozen communities in this dis-

Chief Moran explained that the counsel and advice of representatives of various fire departments throughout this area is being sought in developing the training program.

### COUNTY OFFICIALS TO FIGHT CHANGE IN GAS TAX LAWS

Point Out That Funds So Derived Are Only Method Meeting Interest.

The plan of fifteen mayors of Pennsylvania cities to have the share of the gas tax fund now received by the counties, paid instead to cities, boroughs and townships, will be vigorously opposed by county commissioners John Thomas, Jr., and Frank P. Hollern, and County Controller Henry L. Cannon, the officials announced Monday. Under the present law the county receives one-half cent per gallon of the four cent tax collected by the state. stitute. It will be one of seven similar Of the remaining three and one-half cents, one cent goes to the state unemployment fund and the remainder to the motor fund to be used for highway

"We will vigorosly oppose the pro-posed change in the law," the county officials said. "We wish to point out that the money received by the county can only be used by us for the purpose of paying interest and principal ference because of its central location on the bonded indebtedness of the county, which was incurred before we came into office, for road building purposes or for the purpose of new road or bridge construction or the payment of road damage claims.

"Under no circumstances can this money be used by the county for general operating expenses. Since we took office the money has been used to reduce the county's bonded debt and to pay interest charges. Payments on principal this year will amount to \$535,000 and an additional \$280,000 must

"In addition, we must pay the state this year approximately \$18,000, the four mill tax on our bonded indebtedness. Last year we reduced the county millage 25 per cent or from eight mills to six mills. If we are to be deprived of our share of the gasoline tax fund, which amounts to approximately \$100,-000 annually, it means that we will have to increase the county rate by one mill.

Controller Cannon voiced the belief that if the proposed measure be-comes law, that the cities, boroughs and townships will not reduce their tax rates.

"If the county is deprived of this money by the state and if it is paid to the cities, boroughs and townships, I venture to say that taxpayers in the county will not gain a penny in reduction of taxes," he declared. "As a matter of fact they will be the loser, because naturally the county will be forced to increase its millage so as to

make up the deficiency "I am going to have the Pennsylvania State Controller's Association fight the proposed legislation. I believe that when the taxpayers of the county realize the facts that they, too, will be opposed to such a measure as has been proposed by the mayors."
