

DEATH NOTICES

MRS. MARY DUNEGAN.
Mrs. Mary Dunegan, aged 72 years, a member of a pioneer Northern Cambria County family and one of the best known residents of the county, died at 11:35 o'clock last Friday morning at her home in Clearfield township, near Patton.

Mrs. Dunegan's death terminated an illness of nearly a year of a complication of ailments. A native and lifelong resident of Clearfield township, Mrs. Dunegan was born December 31, 1866, a daughter of Henry B. and Catherine Daugherty Noel, pioneer residents of this section.

Miss Mary Noel and Joseph Dunegan, well known farmer, were united in marriage November 7, 1887, and the couple observed their 51st wedding anniversary last fall.

Mrs. Dunegan was the mother of 13 children, all of whom survive as follows: Thomas J. Dunegan, Clearfield township; Dr. Harry J. Dunegan, Clymer; Dr. Howard H. Dunegan, Ebensburg; Mrs. A. J. Karlheim, Patton, Mrs. John E. Eckenrode, East Carroll Township; Ralph Dunegan and Mrs. Leroy Luther, Patton; Mrs. Gus Warner, Patton; Mrs. Edward Dunn, Pittsburgh; Dr. Joseph H. Dunegan, Pittsburgh; Leonard P. Dunegan, Atlantic City; Earl Dunegan, Pittsburgh, and Mrs. Charles Barnicle, Patton.

She also leaves fifty-one grandchildren and these brothers and sisters: Michael and Charles Noel and Miss Sarah Noel of Clearfield township, and Hugh Noel of Chest Springs.

The funeral services were conducted at nine o'clock on Monday morning with a requiem high mass in St. Mary's Catholic church, Patton. Rev. Father Bertrand McFadyen, O. S. B., pastor, officiated. Interment was made in St. Mary's cemetery.

BROTHER JOSEPH CONWAY.
Brother Joseph Conway, TOR, aged 81, one of the oldest members of the Third Order Regular Franciscan community at Loretto, died on Sunday afternoon at the Mercy hospital in Altoona after having been stricken on a train enroute from Philadelphia.

Returning from a visit in Philadelphia, Brother Joseph was removed from the train at Altoona and taken to the hospital where death ensued two hours later. A heart attack was given as the cause of death.

Born in Philadelphia in 1859, Brother Joseph was the son of John and Mary (Loughran) Conway. He entered the Third Order Regular of the Franciscans in 1889 and had completed a half century as a member of the religious.

Brother Joseph was superior of the Franciscan community at Loretto approximately 30 years ago, and many years ago was instrumental in establishing a branch of the Third Order Regular in Waco, Texas. He is survived by a number of cousins in Philadelphia and Pittsburgh.

The funeral services were conducted on Tuesday morning in the Monastery Chapel at St. Francis College, and interment was made in the Monastery cemetery.

MRS. MARY VAUGHT.
Mrs. Mary Magdeline Vaught, 85, a well known resident of Cresson, died on Saturday morning at the home of her son, Charles Vaught, Cresson. Her death terminated a lengthy illness.

A native of Cambria county, Mrs. Vaught was born January 25, 1854, a daughter of Thomas and Mary Ann (Wasser) Hertzog. She had resided in Cresson for many years.

Her husband, Simon Vaught, died in 1931. Surviving are seven children—Miss Emma Vaught, Cresson; Charles A. Vaught, Cresson; Harry A. Vaught, Altoona; Clement C. Vaught, Cresson; Mrs. B. E. Randall, Carrolltown; Mrs. E. J. Byrne, New York City; and Mrs. D. J. Burley, Loretto. Two children preceded her in death.

She also leaves 45 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

The funeral services were held on Tuesday morning with a high mass of requiem in St. Michael's Church at Loretto, with interment in the church cemetery.

MRS. JAMES RAY.
Mrs. Laura (Horne) Ray, aged 32 years, wife of James Ray, died on Sunday morning in the Miners' hospital at Spangler where she had been a patient since May 12th. She was a resident of Marsteller. The deceased was born on May 9, 1906, a daughter of John and Bertha (Blanker) Horne. Surviving are her husband and these children: Clara Mae, John, Ethel, Harold, Mildred and Marie, all at home.

The funeral services were conducted on Wednesday afternoon at Fruit Hill cemetery in Clearfield county. The Rev. John E. Jackson, pastor of the Barnesboro Presbyterian church, officiated, and interment was in the church cemetery.

Funeral services for John Birchall, aged 38 years, who died on Tuesday morning of this week at his home in Bakerton will be conducted at 10 o'clock on Thursday afternoon at the home of his brother, William Birchall in Barnesboro. Rev. C. J. Switzer, pastor of the Barnesboro M. E. Church, will officiate. Interment will be made in the North Barnesboro cemetery. Mr. Birchall's health had been impaired for several months. He was born in Barnesboro in 1900, a son of James and Mary (Brown) Birchall. Surviving are a son, James, a brother, William Birchall, and four sisters, Mrs. Mary Dukes, Lewistown; Mrs. Martha Jagers, Detroit, Mich.; and Mrs. James Hicks and Mrs. Margaret Dawson, both of Barnesboro.

Funeral services for Miss Maria Jones, aged 79, a former resident of Ebensburg, whose death occurred on Sunday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clair Mauer of Rockwood, were conducted on Wednesday afternoon in the Ebensburg Baptist church and interment was in Lloyd cemetery. Miss Jones, who was born in Cambria Township, had been ill for the past 5 years. A number of brothers and sisters survive.
