HUNTERS ARE GIVEN OWN SAY ON SEASON

Harrisburg.—The general assembly Sunday gave licensed hunters in each county of Pennsylvania the right to decide whether there should be an antlerless deer season in their county.

The legislature's solution of the question that has been in and out of the courts for several years was contained in a bill finally enacted in the House and sent to Governor James.

The bill provides that a petition of fifty per cent of the licensed hunters of any county would prohibit the game commission from declaring an open se-

ason form July 1 to September 30th between 6 a.m. and 7:30 p.m.

Representative Kenneth G. Haines, said the game laws revision measure enacted was a compromise among the sportsmen legislators of the house and

Concerning the changes in the ground hog season, Haines said the present law prevented hunting the animal after 5 p. m.

"Anyone acquainted with ground-hog shooting knows they don't come out until 4 or 5 p. m.

The vote on the bill was 122 to 32.
