1939 ELECTION CAMPAIGN OPENS BEFORE THE END OF MONTH

The 1939 election campaign will begin this month—when candidates circulate their papers for names of supporters in the primaries.

June 24th has been fixed for the opening gun. The aspirants for office have a full month after that for voters to sign their petitions for nomination. They can be withdrawn up till July 29th.

The only state wide offices at stake are one vacancy on the State Supreme Court and three seats on the superior court.

The legislature, before adjourning last week made these changes in the election laws:

1—In straight party voting with paper ballots, separate marks must be made where more than one candidate is to be elected. The straight party mark carries with it no tally for additional candidates for the office.
