**FRANK J. REILLY.**

Frank J. Reilly, aged 50, of Spangler, was found dead on Monday morning in a clump of bushes about 300 feet from the Miners' Hospital, Spangler.

Coroner Patrick McDermott was notified and after conducting an investigation said death resulted from acute alcoholism. Coroner McDermott was informed that Reilly had been drinking heavily for the last few months.

The body was discovered by William McCall and Alfred Abrahams, Spangler. The coroner said the man had

been dead for approximately 8 hours. Reilly was unemployed. He leaves two sisters, both residents of the vicinity of Pittsburgh.

**EMIL C. SCHWING IS SUCCESSOR TO HIBBS**

Governor Arthur H. James last Friday appointed Emil C. Schwing of Johnstown as a workmen's compensa-

tion referee succeeding W. Lloyd Hibbs of Cresson. The salary of the position is \$5,000 a year.

Mr. Hibbs has served as compensation referee during the past four years having been appointed to the position a short time after the Earle administration came into power in the state.

William Lantzy, aged 88 years, one of Northern Cambria's pioneer residents and one of the best known citizens of this section, died on Friday morning last at his home in Spangler

after an illness of several months. Mr. Lantzy's wife, the former Mary Parish, died in 1937, a short time after the couple had celebrated their 65th wedding-anniversary.

William Lantzy and the former Mary Parrish were married November 11th, 1872. The ceremony was performed in St. Benedict's Church at Carrolltown by Rev. Father Giles, now deceased. They moved to Johnstown after the wedding and resided there until the flood of 1889, when they took up their residence in Spangler.

Mr. Lantzy was the father of eleven children, eight of whom are living, as follows: Mrs. E. M. Flick, Beaverdale; Mrs. Clifford Pryce, Ebensburg; Mrs. Raymond Nagle, Spangler; L. E. Lantzy, Turtle Creek; C. H. Lantzy, Latrobe; Leo Lantzy, Port Oxford, Oregon; and Paul and M. J. Lantzy, both of Spangler. He also leaves eleven grandchildren and forty-eight great-grandchildren.
