Orville Young and George Waterous, of Chicago, were guests last week at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Barth Young.

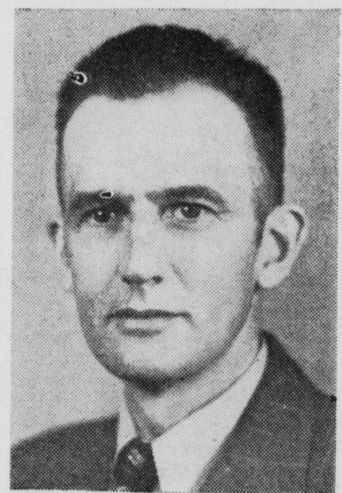
Miss Sylvia Breth, art supervisor at the Clearfield schools, was also a recent guest at the Young home.
