WAR ON RELIF CHISLERS NETS NEARLY \$500,000

Harrisburg.—Pennsylvania's war on relief chiselers has netted the Department of Public Assistance nearly five hundred thousand dollars and resultin the arrest of of approximately 600 percons during 1939, the claim settlement division reports.

Division agents, the figures show, have everaged 4,500 investigations per month since January.

The division was set up on a civil service basis during the Earle administration ot handle the claims of the department against persons receiving as-

sistance illegally. Dr. Julius Tolson, chief of the division, estimated that more than \$1,000,-000 will be recovered by the state relief organization in the form of restitutions and property claims by the end of the year.




