WAR ON RELIF CHISLERS NETS NEARLY \$500,000

Harrisburg.—Pennsylvania's war on relief chislers has netted the Department of Public Assistance nearly five hundred thousand dollars and resulted in the arrest of approximately 600 persons during 1939, the claim settlement division reports.

Division agents, the figures show, have averaged 4,500 investigations per month since January.

The division was set up on a civil service basis during the Earle administration to handle the claims of the department against persons receiving assistance illegally.

Dr. Julius Tolson, chief of the division, estimated that more than \$1,000,000 will be recovered by the state relief organization in the form of restitutions and property claims by the end of the year.

Mr. Wills attended St. Francis Prep and St. Francis College, where he pursued a pre-medical course. While in school, he was an outstanding student and athlete.

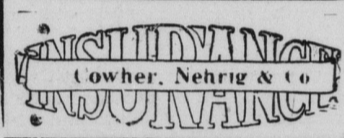

SWEENEY REPORTS

STATE EMPLOYEES PAYING UP TAXES

Harrisburg.—Welfare department employees are paying up delinquent taxes or making arrangements to clean up arrears, Welfare Secretary E. Arthur Sweeney says.

That is the result of Sweeney's ultimatum recently to 6,500 employees in 30 hospitals, penal and correctional institutions that delinquent taxes be paid to avoid "another expedient." It was understood that those who failed to meet obligations to the state or indicate desire to do so as soon as possible, would be dismissed.

Sweeney said he would not disclose names of delinquents or the amount of money involved, to avoid embarrassment.

He pointed out that the tax delinquent state employees set "a bad moral example" adding that they should be the "first to return the taxpayers' money."

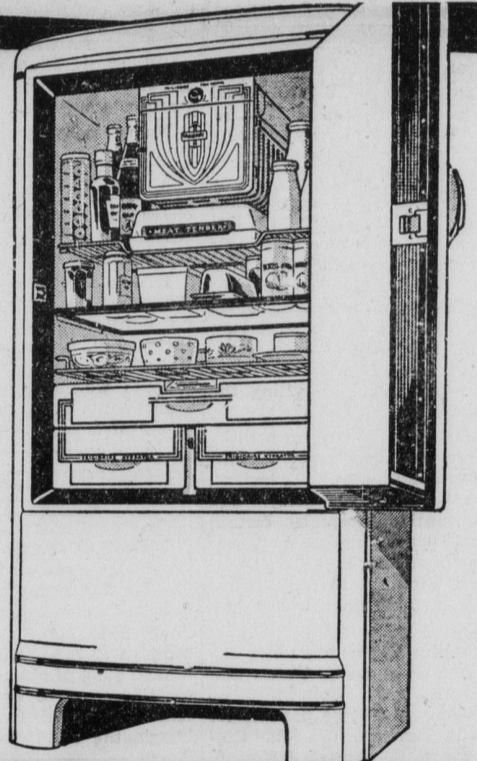
