Reports on the state American Legion convention held last week in Williamsport were presented on Tuesday night at a meeting in the Patton Moose hall.

Jack Fritz, Johnstown, past captain of Johnstown Sons of Legion and a former governor at Boy State Camp at Indiantown Gap, gave an interesting talk on activities of the camp. SERIOUSLY HURT AIDING AUTOIST

A Cherry Tree R. D. man was seriously injured on Tuesday night in one of the most unusual automobile accidents yet written in the annals of this county.

Calvin Trout, 31, is being treated at the Miners' hospital, Spangler for a possible fracture of the skull, deep lacerations of the scalp and abrasions and contusions of the body. His condition was listed as serious.

The victim was reported to have been assisting a motorist to start his stalled automobile and was standing on the rear bumper while another machine pushed the stalled car. Trout was said to have fallen from the bumper of the machine and was struck by an automobile driven by his nephew, Dale McDonnell of Cherry Tree.

The accident happened several miles from Garmantown. McDonnell told Pvt. G. K. Lodge he was unable to stop his machine in time to avoid striking Trout when he fell or was knocked from the bumper of the stalled machine.

Trout was taken to the hospital by McDonnell.

BAN ON POLITICS IN CIVIL SERVICE IS AIM

Harrisburg.—A civil service system in Pennsylvania devoid of politics is the aim of the Employment Board of Public Assistance, members say.

"When we were appointed by Governor James to administer the work of this board," the members said, "we promised to carry on our duties without regard to political considerations. That thought has motivated us since the day of our appointment and we are determined to carry out the Governor's wishes.

"At best it is extremely difficult to administer civil service employments without the cry of politics' being raised, human nature being what it is. When a person fails to qualify for a job or is dismissed because he cannot do the work, he is much more likely to blame 'politics' than he is to admit to his friends and relatives that he has failed. Taking a crack at the Civil Service set-up is his alibi."

60,000 PERSONS ARE PROVIDED WITH JOBS

Jobs for more than six hundred thousand persons, three-fourths of them in private industry, have been found this year by the State Employment Service, it reported.

"Private placement activities of the State Employment Service showed a 15 per cent increase in the week ending July 28th, when 1,651 persons were placed in private employment," said Lewis G. Hines, secretary of Labor and Industry, in whose department the employment service is set up.

That figure was still three per cent below the average week in June, Hines said.
