JAMES MANUS McCANN.
James Manus McCann, aged 66 years, retired railroad engineer, and one of Patton's best known residents, died at four o'clock last Thursday afternoon at his home on Palmer avenue. Death terminated an illness of several months.

Born in Mount Pleasant, Clearfield County, on September 18, 1872. Mr. McCann was a son of Hugh and James (Cullen) McCann. He located in Patton more than forty years ago.

Mr. McCann started to work for the Pennsylvania Railroad as a young man and later entered the employ of the New York Central Railroad. He

served as a locomotive engineer for the company for more than thirty years, and retired three years ago. He had important trains to handle during his tenure of employment with the New York Central.

Prominent in civic affairs in Patton for a number of years, Mr. McCann formerly served as a member of the Borough Council. He held membership in the Clearfield Council of the Knights of Columbus for over forty years.

Mr. McCann was a veteran of the Spanish-American War.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Mary (McCrossin) McCann and these children: Captain Joseph McCann of the Pennsylvania State Motor Police, stationed at Greensburg, Pa.; Fred McCann, of Patton; Thomas McCann, of Nanty-Glo; John McCann, of Patton, and Richard and Mary McCann, both at home.

He also leaves four brothers, Joseph and Hubert McCann both of Osceola Mills; Charles McCann of Philadelphia, and William McCann of Altoona.

The funeral services were conducted at nine o'clock on Monday morning with a requiem high mass in St. Mary's Catholic church, Patton. Rev. Father Bertrand McFadyen, O. S. B., rector, officiated. The remains were taken to Osceola Mills, where interment was made in the McCann family plot in the Immaculate Conception cemetery.

MRS. BERNARD LANTZY.

Mrs. Bernard Lantzy, aged sixty-one years, wife of a well known Hastings coal operator, died last Thursday in the Clearfield hospital, where she underwent a goiter operation several days before. Mrs. Lantzy apparently was on the road to recovery and her death was unexpected.

Mrs. Lantzy was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Angert, both deceased, and was born in Cambria county. STATE TO IMPROVE COUNTY HIGHWAYS
