ORDINANCE NO. 182

AN ORDINANCE of the Borough of Patton, County of Cambria and State of Pennsylvania, authorizing paving with bituminous surface, or otherwise improving Third Avenue, from Magee Avenue to a point south thirteen hundred feet on Third Avenue; Kerr Avenue west from Fifth Avenue to Sixth Avenue; Linwood Avenue, from the intersection of Cowher Avenue to the Borough line; Cowher Avenue, from the intersection of Mellon Avenue to the intersection of Brewer Avenue; Russell Avenue, from the intersection of Fifth Avenue to Sixth Avenue; Lang Avenue, from the intersection of Seventh Avenue to Fourth Avenue; Palmer Avenue, from the end of brick paving in a westerly direction to Borough line; Palmer Avenue, from the main line of Pennsylvania Railroad to Fifth Avenue; Terra Cotta Avenue, from intersection of Fifth Avenue four hundred feet, more or less, in a northerly direction; Fifth Avenue, from the intersection of Terra Cotta Avenue to Flannagan Run Branch of Pennsylvania Railroad; Constitution Avenue, otherwise known as Second Avenue, from the intersection of Magee Avenue to Beech Avenue; Sixth Avenue, from the intersection of Lang Avenue to Magee Avenue; Green Avenue, from the intersection of Linwood Avenue to Mellon Avenue; Herriman Avenue, from the intersection of Fourth Avenue four hundred feet, more or less, in an easterly direction to the Pennsylvania Railroad; Highland Avenue, from the intersection of Third Avenue to Pennsylvania Railroad; Fourth Avenue, from the intersection of McIntyre Avenue to Highland Avenue; University Avenue, from the intersection of Russell Avenue to Park Avenue; Sixth Avenue, from the intersection of Brewer and Cowher Avenues to Russell Avenue; Fifth Avenue Alley from Lang Avenue to Beech Avenue, and providing for the payment of the cost and expense thereof, assessing two-thirds of the cost of paving to the abutting property owners according to the foot front rule, as provided in Article 17, of the Act of Assembly known as "The General Borough Act," approved the 4th day of May, 1927, P. L. 519, and the amendments and supplements thereto. Be it enacted and ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Patton, County of Cambria and State of Pennsylvania, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by authority of the same, as follows: Section I. That Third Avenue, from Magee Avenue to a point south thir-

teen hundred feet on Third Avenue; Kerr Avenue west from Fifth Avenue to Sixth Avenue; Linwood Avenue, from the intersection of Cowher Avenue to the Borough line; Cowher Avenue, from the intersection of Mellon Avenue to the intersection of Brewer Avenue; Russell Avenue, from the intersection of Fifth Avenue to Sixth Avenue; Lang Avenue, from the intersection of Seventh Avenue to Fourth Avenue; Palmer Avenue, from the end of brick paving in a westerly direction to Borough line; Palmer Avenue, from the main line of Pennsylvania Railroad to Fifth Avenue; Terra Cotta Avenue, from intersection of Fifth Avenue four hundred feet, more or less, in a northerly direction; Fifth Avenue, from the intersection of Terra Cotta Avenue to Flannagan Run Branch of Pennsylvania Railroad; Constitution Avenue, otherwise known as Second Avenue, from the intersection of Magee Avenue to Beech Avenue; Sixth Avenue, from the intersection of Lang Avenue to Magee Avenue; Green Avenue, from the intersection of Linwood Avenue to Mellon Avenue; Herriman Avenue, from the intersection of Fourth Avenue four hundred feet, more or less, in an easterly direction to the Pennsylvania Railroad; Highland Avenue, from the intersection of Third Avenue to Pennsylvania Railroad; Fourth Avenue, from the intersection of McIntyre Avenue to Highland Avenue; University Avenue, from the intersection of Russell Avenue to Park Avenue; Sixth Avenue, from the intersection of Brewer and Cowher Avenues to Russell Avenue; Fifth Avenue Alley from Lang Avenue to Beech Avenue, and providing for the payment of the cost and expense thereof, assessing two-thirds of the cost of paving to the abutting property owners according to the foot front rule, as provided in Article 17, of the Act of Assembly known as "The General Borough Act," approved the 4th day of May, 1927, P. L. 519, and the amendments and supplements thereto. Be it enacted and ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Patton, County of Cambria and State of Pennsylvania, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by authority of the same, as follows: Section I. L. 519, and the amendments and supplements thereto. Be it enacted and ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Patton, County of Cambria and State of Pennsylvania, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by authority of the same, as follows: Section I. That Third Avenue, from Magee Avenue to a point south thir-
