GARDNER IS HELD ON MURDER COUNT

John Gardner, 65 year old miner of Barr Township, who Saturday night a week ago is alleged to have shot and killed his neighbor, Joseph Good, near their home, was given a preliminary hearing the other afternoon before Justice of the Peace R. G. Lieb, Nicktown.

Gardner was formally charged with the murder of Good. The information was made by County Detective Charles Cowan, who, with Corp. F. J. Hanley and Pvt. Joseph E. Mannion, of the State Motor Police, conducted the investigation.

Following the hearing, Gardner was committed to the Cambria County jail to await trial at the December term of court.

BARNESBORO PLACES NEW \$10,000 FIRE TRUCK IN SERVICE

The new \$10,000 pumper truck purchased by the Barnesboro Council for the Hope Volunteer Fire Company was delivered last week. The new truck, together with the pumper now in use, a hook and ladder truck and a light squad truck, will give Barnesboro modern and up-to-date fire fighting.

Modern in every way the truck will pump 750 gallons of water per minute and carry 1,500 feet of hose. It also has an enclosed cab capable of carrying 7 men.
