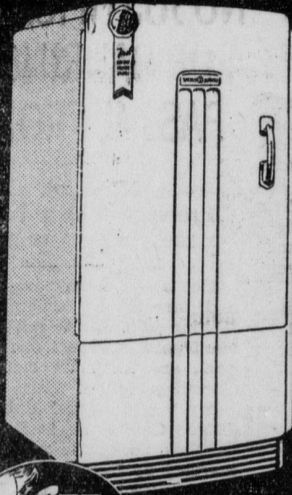

"THE RAINS CAME," IS GREAT FILM AT GRAND SUNDAY AND MONDAY

The power of one of today's great novels finds its full scope on the screen in Darryl F.
