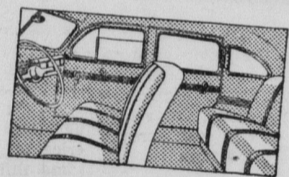

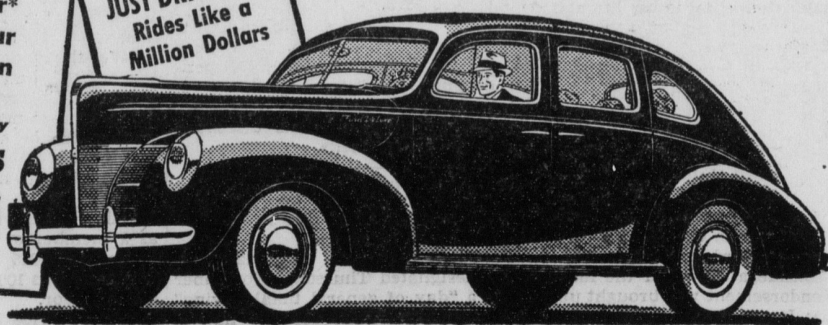

MILK YIELD LOWER.

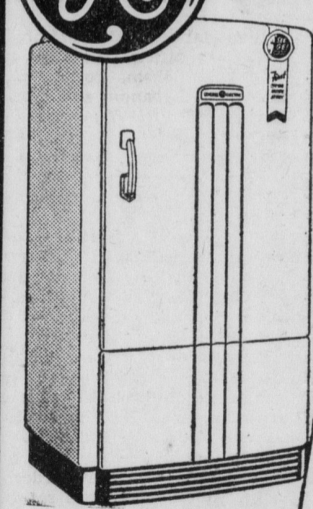
