### HIGHWAY FORCES GET READY TO KEEP ROADS OPEN FOR WINTER

Harrisburg.—Maintenance forces of the state highway department have begun the placing of snow fence preparatory to the department's winter-long policy of keeping the roads open for travel.

During the next few weeks, 12,247-930 feet or more than 2,300 miles of fence will be erected along exposed sections of the highway to check the drifting of snow onto the highway.

Machinery is being assembled and placed in commission for use immediately.

### EBENSBURG BANK IS NAMED AGENT IN SCHWAB ESTATE

The First National Bank of Ebensburg Monday was named to serve as ancillary administrator of the estate left by the late Charles M. Schwab in Cambria County. For the purpose of fixing the bond of the bank as ancillary administrator, the value of the personal estate was fixed at \$10,000.

The bank filed a bond for double the amount or \$20,000. The bank will be required to later file an inventory of any real estate or personal property which Mr. Schwab may have owned in Cambria County. Any inheritance tax which may be collected will be turned over to the State Department of Revenue, the register of wills having nothing to do with the settlement of the estate in this county. This is due to the fact that Mr. Schwab at the time of his death on September 18th was a legal resident of New York. Appointment of the bank was done on petition of Shetig and Swope of Ebensburg, which has for some time been the legal representatives in Cambria County, of the Schwab family.

will tackle another task in stride. Engineers of the department are now compiling data on the mileage of road to be included in the 1939-40 snow removal program. All main highways are included on the snow removal program as is a considerable mileage of the important rural routes.

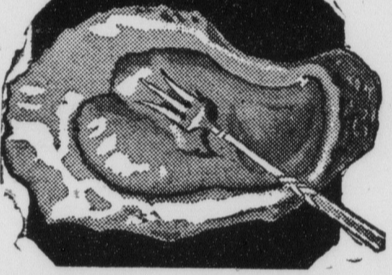
