

GALLITZIN PAYS HIGH TRIBUTE TO DRUM CORPS

Gallitzin residents last Thursday night paid tribute to members of the National Championship American Legion Drum Corps at a banquet served in the American Legion Home.

Legion officials, clergymen and school authorities played glowing tribute to members of the drum corps for the excellent record compiled during the last four years. The drum corps won the state championship for four consecutive years in the face of stiff competition.

In a brief address Leroy Trexler of Cresson said that drum corps similar to the championship Gallitzin outfit are representative of the American Legion. They signify a part of the mammoth program of the American Legion in the United States, he said. "Major program of the Legion is preservation of peace and democracy for the United States."

Dr. Arthur M. Stull, Cambria County Superintendent of Schools, praised highly the accomplishments of the organization and urged the lads to continue the excellent work. He said that the championship corps was one of the finest organizations in Cambria County and even in Pennsylvania.

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SENATOR OWLETT BOOMING GOV. JAMES FOR PRESIDENT

Harrisburg — Senator G. Mason Owlett, Pennsylvania's national Republican committeeman last week came out for Governor James as the party's candidate for President in 1940. "I'm for James for President 100 per cent and I'm going to use all my efforts to further his candidacy — if he'll take it," Owlett asserted.

I think they need in Washington the kind of economy James has given Pennsylvania, and need it badly."

The Republican Governor, who last year turned back the first Democratic Administration in Pennsylvania in almost half a century has said repeated-

ly he would make no move to advance himself as a presidential candidate but has taken the position no one ever turned down the nomination.

Both Owlett and Representative Robert E. Woodside, majority floor leader of the State House of Representatives, predict a Republican sweep in Pennsylvania in the next national election, and forecast that the presidential nominee will carry with him into office the United States Senator and a majority of the congressmen to be elected.

While James has said the state's delegates to the Republican National Convention next year may go "uninstructed," following a Pennsylvania precedent, Owlett commended, "I cannot conceive but that the Pennsylvania

delegation will go 100 percent for James.

"I look for James to become one of the presidential possibilities seriously considered in the national convention." Joseph R. Grundy head of the Pennsylvania Manufacturers Association, said the results of the recent election showed the Governor is "presidential timber" and he'll have my support of he runs."

DROP CLAIM AGAINST PORTAGE WATER CO.

Harrisburg — The Public Utility Commission last Thursday dismissed a complaint of John Mastalski of Portage Township, Cambria County, against the Portage Township Water Company, alleging excessive rates, but

ordered the company to furnish the commission with additional information.

The commission found that while the present rates do not produce an excessive return, they are not attractive to prospective consumers. The commission directed the company to read each consumer's meter quarterly, keep accurate records of each, and submit statements of the consumption of each consumer to the commission during each quarter for a trial period of a year starting January 1.
