ROOSEVELT VICTORY IN 1940 PREDICTED

Chicago.—Gen. Hugh M. Johnson, newspaper columnist and former NRA administrator, last Friday predicted that President Roosevelt will gain a third term as President of the United States. In answer to open forum questions after an address before the Illinois Road Builders Association, Gen. Johnson said he believed Mr. Roosevelt would become a candidate in 1940 "if it was believed he had a chance."

"If he had only a 50-50 chance," Mr. Johnson said, "he would protect the sacred tradition of George Washington, and would not seek again the presidency."

In answer to the question, "Who will be our next President?" Mr. Johnson said: "Franklin Delano Roosevelt."

FIVE ARE HURT IN REVLOC AUTO MISHAP

Five persons were injured, three of them seriously on Sunday evening in a head on collision on the Revloc road. Harry Finnel, 39, of Ebensburg R.
