HUMAN EYE SAID MOST SENSITIVE THING IN NATURE

Regular Tests by New York Scientists Show No Other System As Complicated

The human eye is the most sensitive thing in nature. Single molecules of matter in the eye react like the photographic emulsion when light falls upon them and they change the light into chemicals which affect the optic nerve and then the brain, three New York physicians said recently in an interpretation of how people see this newspaper page.

Dr. Selig Hecht and Dr. Simon Selaer of Columbia University and Dr. Maurice H. Pirenne of the Belgian-American Educational Foundation told members of the American Association for the Advancement of Science at the closing session of the annual meeting that the human eye is so sensitive and so accurate that it can pick up the flash of a light one-billionth of an erg. The erg is the measurement of light energy—the amount necessary to lift one 30,000 of an ounce a distance of a thousandth of an inch.

The New York scientists examined six persons regularly over a period of several months and measured their sensitivity to light intensity and color and found that the eye sees most acutely in the blue-green range of light and the outside rim of the retina of the eye is much more sensitive to light than the center of it.

The persons studied were kept in the dark for 30 minutes and then subjected to 1,000 per second flashes of light and the reaction of light was measured with delicate instruments similar to those used to measure the temperature of the stars hundreds of light years away.

The amount of energy in elementary light units falling on the eye was between 35 and 40 quanta—a quantum being the fundamental unit of light energy. However, it was found that much of it is reflected by the cornea, some is absorbed by the lens, and only eight or nine molecules of visual purple—the light absorbing chemical of the eye—are affected by light flashes.

Judging from the structure of the retina of the eye, the structure of the eye and the chemistry of visual purple "it is hard to conceive of a biological system which could be more sensitive than this," the New York physicians declared, "and certainly there are no physical systems which can even approach it."

WPA WAGES LOWER THAN GOOD LIVING

The WPA in Pennsylvania has blossomed out with its own newspaper, known as the "Pennsylvania WPA Review."

In its second issue it prints the results of a survey made of living costs. The survey found that WPA wages are too low. In only two counties, Green and Washington, and then only in the metropolitan areas were WPA wages anywhere near a good living subsistence.

In many counties the WPA wage fails to reach the subsistence level established by the state department of public assistance.

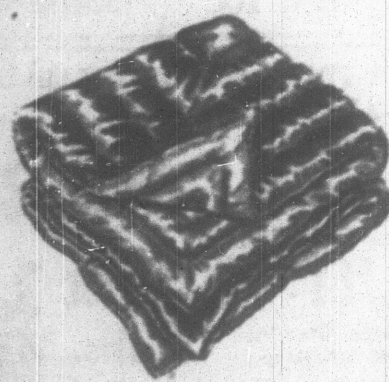

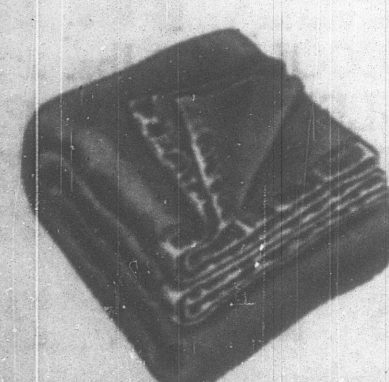
