USED CAR SALES SHOW EGG INCREASE Early indications point to a severe winter—and stress the advisability of early used car buying for the sake of the greater security which a newly-reconditioned car provides. L. H. Averill, manager of Chevrolet's Pittsburgh zone, made the point this week in discussing the heavy used car sales volume reported by the dealers in the area. The uncertain driving conditions prevailing over much of the country today account for the large volume of used car buying at this time, he said.

"Instead of waiting until spring to trade their present cars in, they take the step at a season when it will do them the most good. 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GABLE, HEDY LAMARR IN COMEDY ROLE AT GRAND THEATRE

Introducing Hedy Lamarr in her first action comedy role, with Clark Gable as her romantic co-star, "Comrade X" hits a new high in hilarious funmaking. The new picture will be shown at the Grand Theatre, Patton on Sunday and Monday, January 12 and 13th.

The public knows what to expect in the adventuring role of an American newspaperman in Russia, his first out-and-out comedy since "It Happened One Night," and he didn't let them down. It is Miss Lamarr, however, who is no less than a sensation in a new type of role for her, a Moscow lady street car "mobsterman." There are no half way measures about Miss Lamarr's transformation, and she is a definite hit as a comedienne, sharing Gable's daredevil escapades. She has two slam-bang fights, one with Gable, operates a street car, drives a tank and gives an animated performance good for a thousand laughs.
