

**POLITICAL BEES ARE ON THE BUZZ WITH PRIMARIES 7 MONTHS YET OFF**

Although the primaries will not be held until September 9, political bees are starting to buzz around Cambria County. Already the woods are beginning to fill with hunters of political jobs.

To be nominated at the September primaries for the election to be held November 4 in Cambria will be two candidates to succeed President Judge John H. McCann and Judge Charles C. Greer. The sheriff's office will also be one of the "plums" sought at the election this year, as the term of Sheriff Cyrus W. Davis expires in January and under the law he can not be a candidate to succeed himself. Two jury commissioners also will be named this year as the terms of Mrs. Sarah B. Kennedy of Johnstown and Frank P. Cammarata of Patton expire.

Republican lawyers mentioned as being candidates for the judgeships are Judge Charles C. Greer, who in all probability will be a candidate to succeed himself; Harry A. Englehart, who will again make an effort to gain a place on the bench; District Attorney Stephens Mayer, Frank P. Barnhart, Ray Patton Smith and George W. Griffith. The candidacy of Mr. Griffith, however, it is believed, will depend to a great extent upon to recover he makes from injuries sustained in a recent automobile accident in the state of Maryland. It has been indi-

cated, however, by Mr. Griffith's physician that he will in all likelihood be in condition to conduct a vigorous campaign.

The only Republicans reported at present as possible candidates for sheriff are Deputy Sheriffs Robert Kenney and Wendell L. Larimer and Co. Detective Charles Cowan.

The list of Democratic candidates for the judgeship probably will be headed by Judge McCann. The judge probably will be a candidate for the Supreme Court if two vacancies are to be filled this year. However, at present, there is only one vacancy. In the event there are two vacancies to be filled, Judge McCann, if he can obtain the Democratic nomination, would be certain of election. Under a constitutional provision, where two judges are to be elected to the State Supreme Court in any one year, they must be of different parties.

Other attorneys mentioned as possible Democratic candidates for the judgeships are C. Randolph Myers, Albert L. O'Connor, Philip Lopresti, and Joseph J. Kintner.

Political gossip mentions the names of many Democrats as potential candidates to succeed Sheriff Davis. They include Former Sheriff Michael J. Boyle, Alderman James Malloy, Patrick Daugherty, former county highway maintenance engineer, George Hoppel of Patton, John Trebus, Barnesboro businessman, Leo H. Akers, president of Johnstown Sportsmen's Association, Former Recorder Leo McKerrick, Mike DeGretto, Democratic

Committeeman of Colver, Frank J. Penrack, Cambria City mortician. Also to be nominated at the September primary will be election officers in all districts, tax collectors, township assessors, aldermen and justices of the peace in some districts, supervisors in townships, borough councilmen and township auditors.

**LEADER LOOKS TOWARD FUTURE WITH INDUSTRY COUNCIL HIS PURPOSE**

(Continued from Page 1.) but he insists not only on that point but on work at decent wages.

Labor today has power through a widespread organization such as it did not have in the World War period.

The defense program demands uninterrupted production. Mr. Murray's object is to get that as far as possible, but without sacrificing the real rights and needs of labor. To assure a just deal for labor, he proposes the defense councils, whose duty it would be to protect labor's rights and help adjust its grievances in co-operation with industry and government.

"We naturally hope and intend to improve our conditions of employment and our wage standards," he declared. "But, we contend, is a legitimate, constitutional and God-given right. We will naturally refuse to yield to the greed and rapacity of certain vicious employers who have no regard for either the needs of their employes or the welfare of the country.

"The moral, economic and spiritual well-being of our country depends upon industry's willingness to work out with organized labor its ordinary, sensible collective bargaining procedures, wage and other standards that will provide at least some semblance of decency and comfort to American working men and women and their dependents. This, we truly believe, is a part of America's total defense."

The CIO, he said, has a wholesome respect for its contractual obligations and expects in the future as in the past to live up to them.

"A strike," he said, "is not to be likened to an act of God, but to the failure of industry to meet labor as an equal."

He renews strongly what he calls "unfair efforts to blame labor" for delays in the defense program, which he said must be placed squarely upon the shoulders of industry. Likewise, he will fight with every resource at his command the numerous bills flooding the hoppers of Congress for anti-strike and compulsory arbitration legislation.

Industrial peace has been created now as never before in this country in those industries over which the CIO assumes jurisdiction and in which its affiliated unions have collective bargaining agreements, he said.

One duty of defense councils, as he outlined them would be to "promote industrial peace through the perfection and extension of sound collective bargaining relations between management and organized labor and through adherence to all laws affecting the rights and welfare of labor. They would offer a conference table adjustment of industrial disputes among representatives of industry, labor and of government."



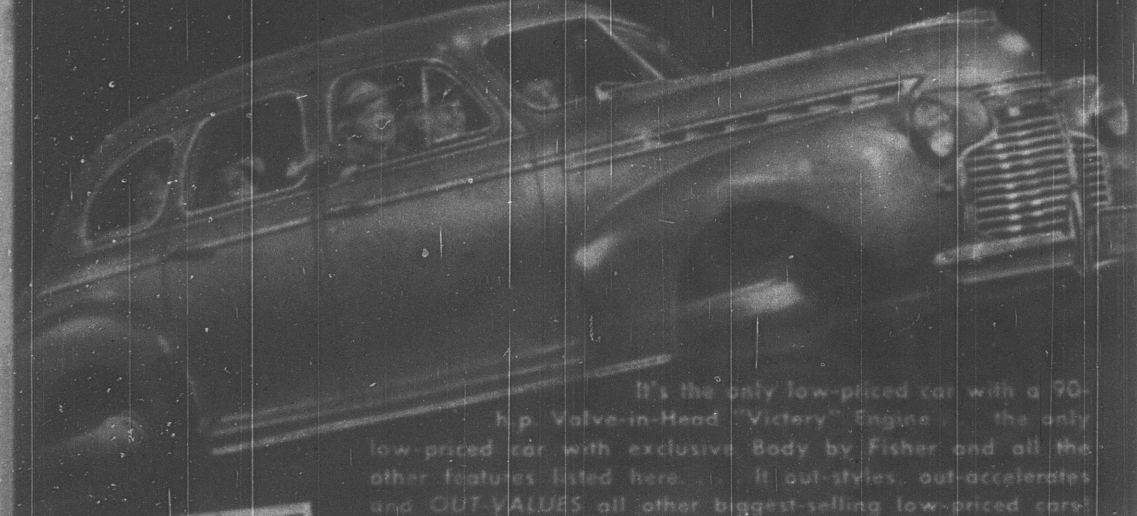
