

LIQUOR BOARD CURB SOUGHT

Proposal by Owens-Chervenak to Restrict Penalizing Powers

Harrisburg—Two Cambria County legislators proposed Tuesday that the State Liquor Control Board be restricted to minor penalties in dealing with law violations by taproom proprietors. Representatives Thomas A. Owens and Michael C. Chervenak Jr., Democrats, introduced in the House a bill to limit the powers of the board in suspending or revoking the licenses of retail liquor dispensers.

Sponsors of the bill proposed this set of penalties:

- For the first offense—Suspension of not more than 15 days.
- For the second offense within a year—Suspension of not more than 30 days.
- For the third offense within a year—Suspension of not more than 60 days.

The proposed amendment stipulated that "a third offense within the period of a year may be cause for the revocation of such license," but proposed that all revocation proceedings be tried before the criminal court of the county in which the taproom is located.

Under the Owens-Chervenak proposal, liquor board attorneys would petition the local court to grant a rule on the licensee to show cause why his license should not be revoked, with hearing to be held before the court

and the court deciding on the revocation.

The liquor board now has the power to suspend or revoke licenses, and may accept payment of a fine of \$10 for each day of suspension, instead of forcing the licensee to close his bar for the suspension period.

Another proposed amendment by Representative Earl Chudoff, Democrat of Philadelphia, would protest unscrupulous customers from "skippy" whiskey glasses by requiring that any glass or other container in which such beverage is sold shall be clearly marked to indicate its volume content in ounces.

UPSWING OF MINES IN LAST YEAR FELT BY TWO DISTRICTS

An Increased Demand for Bituminous Coal Continues in the Cambria County Section

The general upswing in mining operations in the bituminous fields was reflected by the annual report of William Lamont, state mine inspector of the 10th District, comprising central Cambria County.

Inspector Lamont, named in December to succeed William H. Piler, who was transferred to another inspection district, reported a total production of 4,287,797 tons for 1940.

While a comparison of 1940 and 1939 tonnage shows a decrease of 288,000 tons, the report for last year does not include 1,067,462 tons produced at Nanty Glo by the Heisley Coal Company, a mine which was transferred to the 36th District since the 1939 report was compiled.

Lamont's District showed a gain of 288,578 tons over and above deflection caused by transfer of more than 1,000,000 tons to another district. Enforced shutdown of Sonman operations for a period following the July disaster last year also affected the district production.

Of the total district tonnage, 2,505,366 tons were produced mechanically. Pick mining accounted for 1,138,067 tons. Mechanical loading accounted for 644,394 tons.

There were six fatal accidents in 1940, there were 52 accidents involving loss of more than 60 days and 438 accidents in which the injured men were out less than 60 days. There were 526 men employed in the district last year. There were 83 "sixty-day" accidents in 1939 and 597 less than 60 days.

Excluding the Sonman disaster production last year was 714,628 tons per fatal accident.

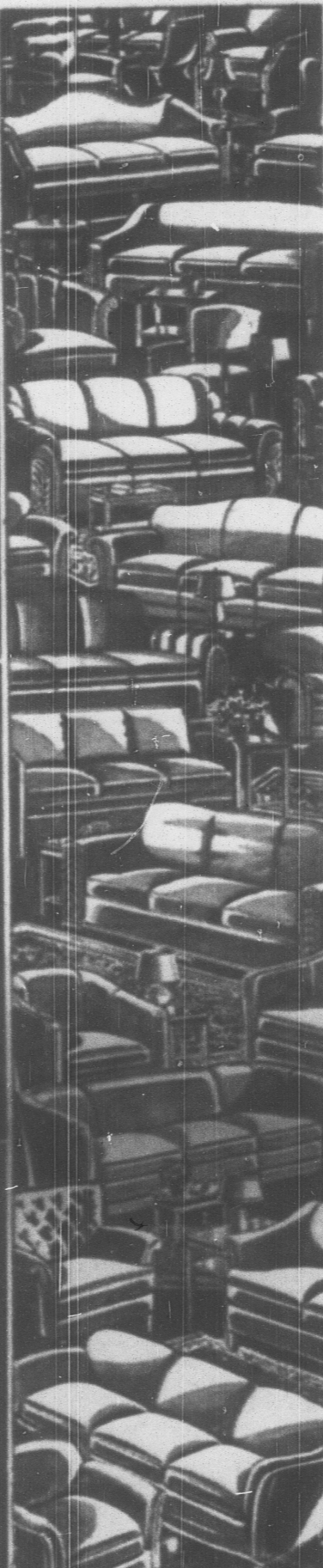

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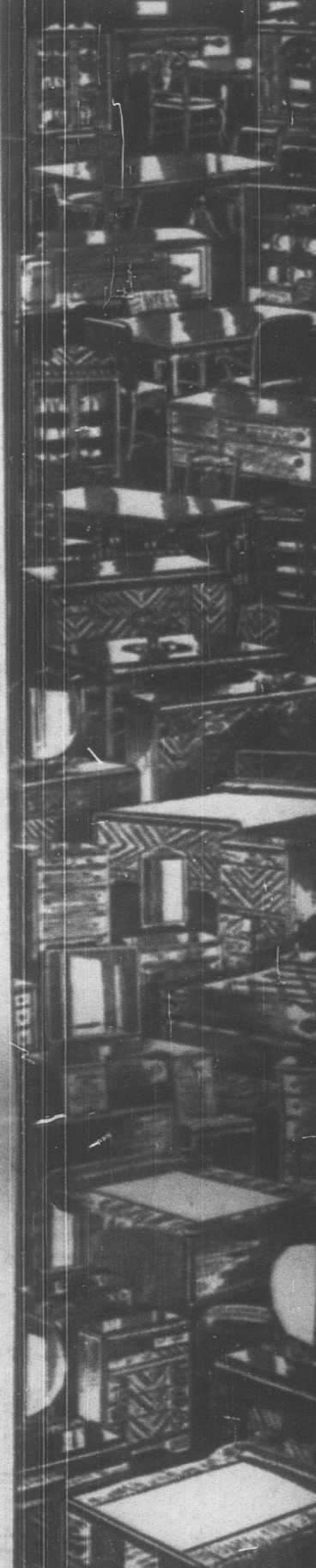
