

Solson to Give Exhibitions

Set Back Trout Season Opening

A bill delaying the opening of trout season from midnight until 5 a. m. April 5, won unanimous approval in the Senate last week and was sent to the governor for consideration.

The measure bore the approval of the fish commission. It was amended in the House to provide that there be no fishing of any kind between 5 p. m. April 14 until 5 a. m. April 15 in the streams stocked by the state.

The Senate concurred in the House changes.

EBENSBURG OFFERS DEFENSE CLASSES

Will Be Tuition-Free Course At Ebensburg High School

Ebensburg will be among the 100 towns and cities in Pennsylvania where a 10-week tuition-free summer course in introductory engineering subjects will be offered to high school graduates by Pennsylvania State College. It has been announced by J. Orvis Keller, assistant to President Ralph D. Hetzel, who is in charge of the extension. The course will be conducted in the rooms of Ebensburg-Cambria Township High School.

The course, largest of its kind in this section to be offered as part of the national engineering defense program under the U. S. Office of Education, began at the close of the school year.

Operating five days a week, full day time schedule, the course will prepare 3,000 "superior" high school graduates who do not intend to enter college in the fall for jobs in defense production. Completion of the work, Mr. Keller said, should help to equip young men for positions in industry, for further advanced training in other engineering emergency work, and for promotions in industrial jobs.

The University of Pittsburgh and the Carnegie Institute of Technology will conduct similar programs in the Pittsburgh area, along with Pennsylvania State College.

The program will include basic training in elementary engineering subjects such as chemistry, physics, engineering drafting, mathematics and mechanics, but should not be looked upon as a substitute for regular college training. Mr. Keller emphasized.

As a result of the summer training students will be qualified to continue later in such specialized courses as operation, inspection, tool design, testing, production engineering, drafting, metallurgy and fuel technology.

To enroll for the course each student must be a graduate of a four-year high school program. He must have at least two years of mathematics including algebra and geometry, and one year of science. He must also receive the recommendation of his high school principal and the consent of his parents.

Students who enroll will be expected

to purchase course material not in excess of \$30. Tuition is borne by the government. Graduates of this year's senior class and of recent classes who have the requirements will be accepted.

The course is being offered because industry, civil service, ordinance and other parts of the government are urgently in need of technically trained personnel, including inspectors, designers, draftsmen and technologists in general.

Meanwhile the part-time night courses in engineering and other technical subjects being conducted for approximately 10,000 men in 50 towns and cities throughout the state, under the engineering defense training program, will continue, Mr. Keller said.

Rule Changed in State System of Compensation

A change in the waiting period for persons filing claims for unemployment compensation has been announced by Lewis G. Hines, secretary of labor and industry. The new procedure complies with a recent ruling of the board of review. Mr. Hines explains that in order to comply with the board's ruling "Section 401 (e) of the Pennsylvania unemployment compensation law must be strictly adhered to."

This section of the law requires that any compensable week shall be preceded by three weeks of waiting within the prior 52 weeks. Previously after a claimant had received all checks for benefits due him in a benefit year he had no further rights and could not file any claims for waiting weeks until after the benefit year had ended.

Once the claimant had received his first check in the benefit year he was entitled to receive a check for each unemployed week that he was eligible, up to his limit of 13 weeks or less as was shown on his notice of decision without having to serve any additional week or weeks of waiting except in case of an industrial dispute.

Under the new waiting week policy which has been established to conform to the decision referred to, the claimant may, if unemployed, and otherwise eligible, file waiting weeks during the benefit year for the week or weeks in the last part of his benefit year.

The intent of this decision should be understood clearly. It requires that a claimant must have the necessary weeks of waiting within a period of 52 weeks preceding each and every week for which he claims benefits with this qualification, however, that where a claimant is actually in the process of drawing benefits for consecutive weeks of unemployment, payments began when he met the requirements shall not be interrupted merely because the claimant, during the continuous period for which he files, ceases to have the required waiting weeks.

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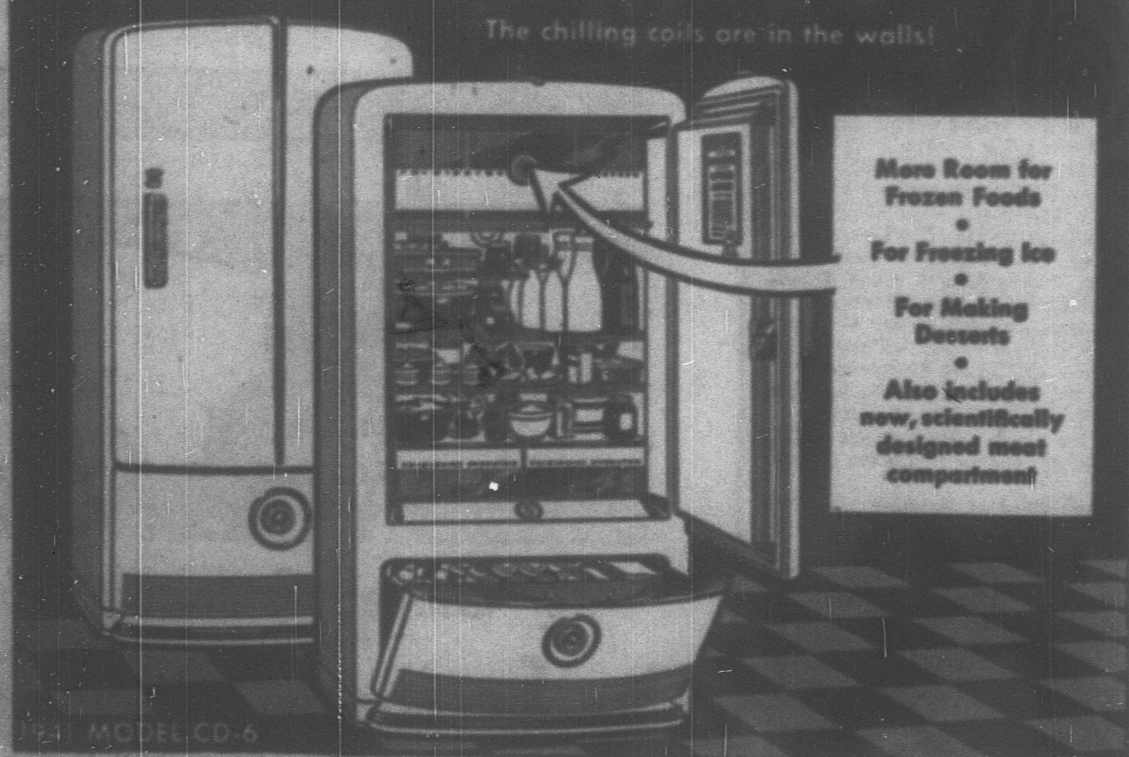
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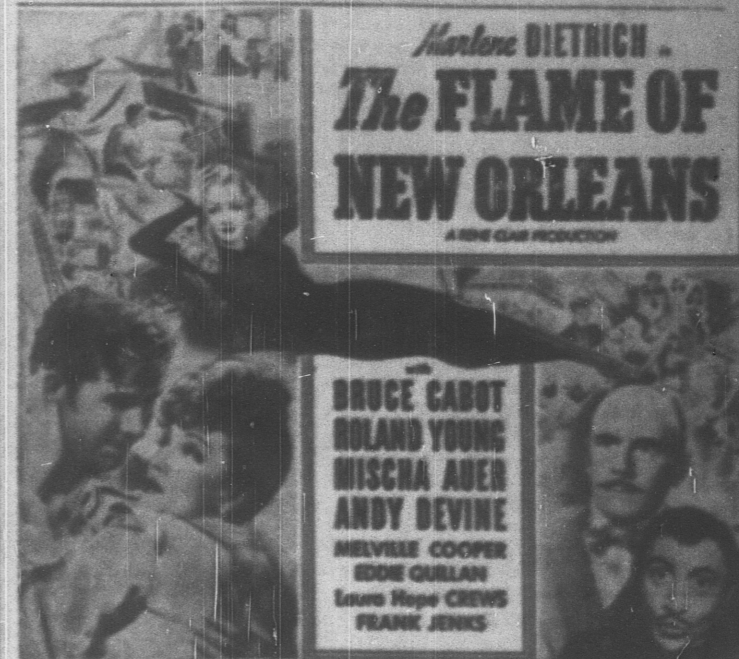

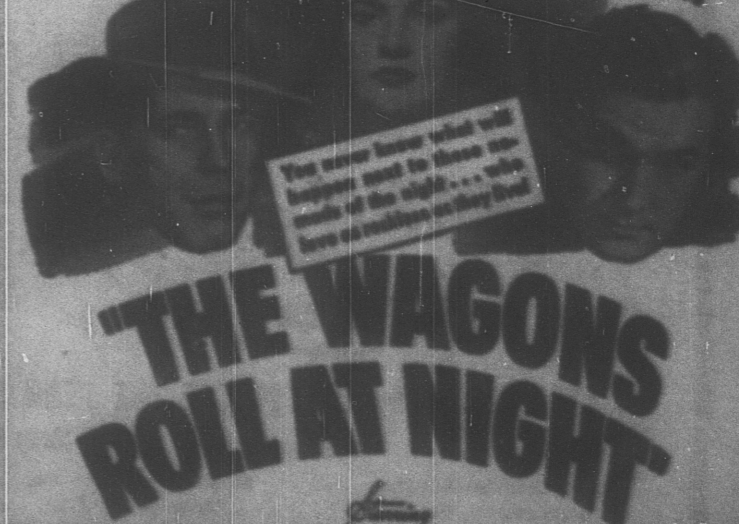
