Bass Stocking Is Begun in Pennsylvania Lakes

The Fish Commission has begun its program of stocking bass in the lakes of the Commonwealth. C. A. French, Commissioner of Fisheries has announced.

This is the first year the Commission has had a statewide lake stocking program. Under the new setup lakes which have an area of forty acres or more and are open to public fishing, and which now contain bass are included in the program.

Commissioner French also announces that a complete survey of all of the hatcheries indicate the Board will have the finest bass distribution in its history. The number raised and distributed this year should be well over half a million fish ranging in size from two to eight inches.

Old Broomsticks Become Checkers for Army Camps

COUNTY WPA WORKERS TO BE GIVEN PAY BOOST

A 5.20 a month wage increase for lower paid WPA workers will affect around 60,000 persons on the rolls in Pennsylvania, Col. Philip Mathews, state WPA administrator, says.

The raise, announced in Washington by Howard O. Hunter, WPA commissioner, applied to all those earning less than \$90 a month but did not affect persons working 40 to 48 hours a week on defense projects.

In Pennsylvania, WPA headquarters explained, the increase would apply to all project workers except professional and technical workers in the larger counties and about 2,000 working on defense jobs.

There are 2,535 professional employees in the state and those in those counties would not receive the increase: Philadelphia, Luzerne, Allegheny, Lackawanna, Fayette, Erie, Northampton, Lehigh, Berks, Montgomery, Delaware, Westmoreland and part of Washington.

The technical workers in those counties receive \$94.90 a month. In other counties they receive less and will be eligible for the raise.

The rolls now list 64,979 persons.
