Football referees and other officials on the field have a definite and readily understood set of arm signals. Everybody is familiar with the baseball umpire's gesture as he signals a runner is out at first. Naval men signal to nearby ships through a system of flag waving maneuvers. Surgeons have their own hand signals for indication to a nearby assistant, intern or nurse, just which instrument they desire for a particular operation. Muffled in mask, the surgeon cannot voice his need for this or that instrument—so he gestures. A well-trained nurse correctly interprets the surgeon's signal. In many cases, where surgeon and assistant have teamed together in similar operations, the assistant anticipates the immediate need. There is a particular hand signal for the scalpel, the most familiar of the surgeon's instruments. Another gesture calls for the hemostat, a pincer-like clamp that checks blood flow from a severed vessel. Retractors, scissors, needle and suture or any one of more than 30 different kinds of instruments are indicated by a hand signal from the surgeon. Dexterity with the tools of his pro-

fession are second-nature to a skilled surgeon.

The difference between a good surgeon and a great one may be the ease with which he manipulates his instruments and, more importantly, his capability of quick thinking with display of good judgment during an operation.

**NEW SAFETY METHODS URGED BY SECRETARY**

Keystone Auto Club Official Says Present Methods of Slowing Speeders Ineffective

James J. Whelan, secretary of the Keystone Auto Club, calls for a complete re-examination of the safety and traffic law enforcement problem in Pennsylvania.

Mr. Whelan questioned the effectiveness of "new records" in number of speeding arrests by the State Motor Police and a 95 per cent increase in the number of license suspensions for speeding.

"Highway killings are mounting in Pennsylvania—step by step—with the new records. The situation as it exists today calls for complete re-examination of the Safety and enforcement problem in Pennsylvania, with the burden of proof upon the Commonwealth to demonstrate that present methods are the most effective that can be devised.

"Preventive enforcement appears to be dying a lingering death in this state, while top-heavy figures are amassed to show activities of the State Motor Police in running down alleged violators of the speed law. Which is more important, a bulging statistical file or fewer funerals? It is not more important to catch a speeder or prevent him from speeding?"

"If more arrests and more suspensions resulted in fewer deaths, we should be among the first to commend the authorities and urge continuation of such salutary practices. But when the death rate increased 13.36 per cent in the first seven months of the year in the face of record punitive measures, we believe it is time for a re-appraisal of the entire situation."

**SEVERAL ARE INJURED IN WEEK-END CRASHES**

Blanche Olenschick, the six-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Olenschick of Bakerston, was injured on Saturday afternoon when she was struck by an automobile near her home. She was admitted to Miners Hospital at Spangler, suffering from concussion of the brain and brush burns of the body. The driver of the machine said the girl stepped directly into his path and he was unable to avoid striking her.

Clayton Stevens, Garmantown, suffered laceration of the right wrist and left arm and shoulder at 11 o'clock Saturday night when his auto collided with a truck driven by Ralph Reed of Barnesboro. The accident occurred on Route 219 in Barnesboro.

Stevens was treated in the dispensary of the Miners Hospital, Spangler. Mrs. Laura Hering, 47, Hastings, was injured early Sunday morning as the automobile in which she was riding crashed into an embankment on the Hastings-St. Benedict road. She was admitted to Spangler Hospital suffering from a fracture of the right collarbone.

When an auto in which he was riding failed to make a curve and crashed Sunday morning, William Cante-loupe, 18, Spangler, suffered a fracture of the right arm. The car was operated by Mike Crossin of Spangler and the mishap occurred on the Barnesboro-Marsteller road.

**ENROLLMENTS IN CCC SHOW SHARP DECREASE**

Pennsylvania's CCC enrollment has tumbled from 17,000 to 8,900 enrollees within the past year, public assistance officials disclose, attributing a sharp decrease to the state's defense-spurred industries.

Howard L. Russell, public assistant secretary, explains that during the past twelve months many of the boys have secured jobs in private industry, and in addition approximately 800 of the enrollees either have enlisted in the Army or have been drafted under the Selective Service Act.

"The CCC regulations provide an honorable discharge for any enrollee who secures a job," Russell said. "The number of CCC camps in the state has decreased from 38 last year to 19 this year, and officials have given orders to close an additional 6 camps this month."

**Pennsylvania AFL Probes Priorities Unemployment**

The executive council of the Pennsylvania State Federation of Labor has initiated an investigation to determine how much unemployment has been caused by priorities. James E. McDevitt, president of the Federation announced.

The Federation has sent questionnaires to 27000 local unions in this state affiliated with the AFL to find out the extent of the defense orders throughout the state and the amount of unemployment caused by lack of materials due to priorities. The findings resulted from the study, together with recommendations will be sent to President of AFL, William Green.

Mr. McDevitt said many rural sections have been seriously affected by the closing of small plants. "Workers in such factories," he declared, "cannot get defense jobs in their own areas, because of inadequate distribution of defense contracts among small producers." He pointed out that all kinds of metal trade workers engaged in non-defense production have been hardest hit by priorities. In many cases their only choice is to leave non-defense jobs for defense jobs, which means leaving home.

**Moe L. Annenberg Denied Second Appeal for Parole**

M. L. Annenberg, publisher of the Philadelphia Inquirer, has been denied a parole a second time, Justice Dept. officials at Washington say.

Annenberg is in the federal penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pa., serving a three-year sentence for tax evasion, imposed in Federal Court at Chicago. He entered prison July 22, 1940, and his first request for a parole was denied early in July. Another review of his applications was rejected on November 8. He will be eligible for release November 11, 1942, provided he wins full credit for good behavior.
