Miss Lois A. Turner, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. James A. Turner, of Patton, and believed to be one of the youngest licensed aviators in the United States, was tendered a party at her home on her 17th birthday anniversary. Miss Turner was presented a large birthday cake with 17 candles. A program was carried out by a group of her friends in the parsonage of the local Methodist church. The Patton aviator has been flying since she was 14 years old. She received her license to fly when she celebrated her 16th birthday anniversary. At that time no other record could be found of a younger aviator in the United States. Miss Turner at 17 years of age is still one of the youngest licensed fliers in the country. She is treasurer and plane dispatcher at the Keystone Airport near Ebensburg.

Coal First Shipped "By Rail" in 1812 at Leeds in England

The first recorded movement of coal "by rail" was in 1812 at Leeds in England, when an engine made by Blenkinsop hauled 33 coal wagons on a railroad at a speed of 3 1/2 miles per hour.

In the United States, the first application of steam to coal transportation was in 1829 and was made by Horatio Allen at Honesdale, for the Delaware and Hudson Canal Co. His locomotive, called the "Stourbridge Lion" and weighing seven tons, was imported from England. It ran at a speed of ten miles per hour. But inasmuch as at that time the total rail mileage of the U. S. did not exceed 40 miles, Horatio Allen's engine would have been able to negotiate the entire run in four hours if all the lines had been inter-connected.
