ANOTHER PRIMARY IS JUST AROUND THE CORNER IN CAMBRIA

Balloting to Come in May; Some Candidates Noted Already

Now that the election is over, there is another election "around the corner."

The 1942 primary election will be held May 18th.

No county offices will be filled next year and there'll be no voting for school director or municipal offices in boroughs and townships.

For those who do not aspire to succeed the "breaker boy" Governor or Sam Lewis, there are two jobs open to citizens of Johnstown and 3 in the county.

The second district of Cambria County will name successors to Assemblymen Albert L. O'Connor, Thomas A. Owens and Michael C. Charvatsk, all Democrats.

Congressman Harve Tibbitt's term expires next year as Representative for the 27th Pennsylvania District—Cambria, Indiana, Jefferson and Armstrong counties—but the business of naming Congressmen next year has been missed up considerably by the failure of the 1941 legislature to re-appoint the districts in conformity with the 1940 U. S. census.

Johnstown Retail Coal Producers and U. M. W. A. Heads Iron Out Some Problems

Scale Committees of the United Mine Workers and the Greater Johnstown Retail Coal Producers Association met on Tuesday of this week in Johnstown to discuss provisions of a two year contract that will govern production of coal for domestic use in and around Johnstown.

The pact, when signed, will cover about 75 retail mines employing between 600 and 800 men, according to officials of the association. It will be patterned after and include all provisions of the nation wide Appalachian Agreement and the recently signed District No. 2 agreement with some special sections covering particular operations in the smaller mines.

SEAMAN EARL NAGLE HONORED AT DINNER ON TUESDAY EVENING

17-Year-Old Chest Springs Reuben James Survivor Home on 15-Day Furlough

More than half a hundred Northern Cambrians Tuesday night paid homage to Earl G. Nagle, 17-year-old Chest Springs seaman, a survivor of the torpedoed destroyer Reuben James, at a testimonial dinner in the Commercial Hotel, Patton.

The dinner was given under sponsorship of Walter McCoy Post, American Legion, John White Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Patton Chamber of Commerce. Walter Noonan, Legion post commander, was the toastmaster.

Rev. Father Bertrand McFadden, O. S. B., pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church, Patton, of which Nagle is a member, was principal speaker. He paid tribute to the young man's loyalty in joining the Navy and placing his life in peril in the end that this country may remain free.

Under strict naval orders not to reveal any military secrets concerning the sinking, Seaman Nagle however permitted to tell of his grueling experience after the destroyer was hit by a torpedo, presumably from a German submarine.

The young seaman said he was in his bunk in the stern of the ship when the torpedo hit and that he was thrown to the deck. He said he first endeavored to find his life-jacket but when unable to do so he rushed to the top deck.

Telling of his experience, Seaman Nagle said in part: "When I saw the ship was sinking I leaped overboard into the swirling cold water. I spied a raft and started swimming. I was pushed up against the raft and was crushed by it, but I survived it. The second sea was worse. It pushed me under water and I thought I was a goner for sure. However, I finally bobbed up again and grabbed the raft."

We floated in this manner for about an hour or more before another American ship pulled right up to us out of the night. It was still fairly dark between 5:30 and 6 a. m. They threw over a net and we climbed up the side. Some of the fellows had to be helped, but I managed it myself. The young sailor arrived back in the U. S. Monday of last week and spent all day Thursday on a train en route home. Arriving in Altoona, he hitch-hiked the rest of the way to the home of his parents.

Nagle is serving a four year enlistment in the Navy, having signed up last April 1. He spent two months at the Naval Training Station at Great Lakes, Ill., then shipped aboard the U. S. destroyer Reuben James from Philadelphia July 17.

Nagle has two brothers in the Army. Serenus W. Nagle, private in the 42nd Corps, stationed at Middletown, Pa., and Thomas Vincent Nagle, 24, private first-class in the infantry, stationed at Fort William Davis, Panama Canal Zone.

Auditor General F. Clair Ross has approved payment of \$13,011.64 as the states semi-annual contribution to second class townships in Cambria county for construction and maintenance of roads and bridges.
