Two Counterfeiters Arrested in Vintondale on Friday

Harry Lekoyski of New York, and Joseph Sidack of Republic, Pa., were held for Federal Court Friday afternoon by U. S. Commissioner Ray Patton Smith after they had pleaded guilty to a charge of possessing and passing counterfeit money.

Bond was set at \$10,000 each by Smith, and they were taken to the Allegheny County Court to await a trial.

Neither could furnish bond. The defendants were arrested Friday in Vintondale after they allegedly had passed four \$20 bills. They possessed \$254.00 of legal currency and one \$20 bogus bill. The two men were only released recently from a Federal Penitentiary where they had served terms on similar charges.
