

SOCIAL SECURITY FUNDS SHOWING RISE IN STATE

Program Said Proving to Be One of Strongest Bulwarks of Social Structure

Virtually doubling in number and amounts during the second full year of operations on a monthly benefit basis, old age and survivors insurance payments amounting to \$936,347 a month are being sent to 54,971 men, women and children in Pennsylvania...

These figures were released the other day by William L. Dill, regional director of the Social Security Board at Philadelphia, who pointed out that the federal family insurance payments had reached a rate above \$11,000,000 a year in Pennsylvania...

Payments to young widows with dependent children in their care more than doubled, in both number and amount, with 5,289 such widows receiving \$103,528 a month. This same is true with respect to payments to dependent children of workers who died or retired...

Emphasizing the fact that America entered the first World War without any comparable economic provision for its aged, orphans and widows, Dill said:

"This program will prove to be one of the strongest bulwarks of our social and economic structure by the time we have won our bitter struggle for the preservation of freedom and a decent way of life."

CONGRESSMEN GET FEW STATE LABOR COMPLAINTS

A random inquiry among congressmen from Pennsylvania has indicated that complaints of defense work stoppages or demands for suspension of the wage-hour law have been relatively negligible.

Rep. Samuel A. Weiss, Glassport, Democrat, taking cognizance of statements in the House that the public was demanding curbs on labor, said he asked industries in the Pittsburgh area to give him a report. He said a collection of telegrams showed virtually all of them were working at capacity.

"One plant said it would have to cut its work week because of shortage of tin," said Weiss. "Carnegie-Illinois said its production rate was the highest in history and was maximum with facilities and materials now available."

Senator James J. Davis, Republican, said his mail was heavy enough but relatively little of it dealt with labor legislation. The office of Senator Joe Guffey, Democrat, reported about the same.

LEGAL NOTICES

ORDINANCE NO. 184

Relating to the National Defense, prescribing rules and regulations pertaining to air raids and blackouts, and emergency plans involving public peace, health and safety, defining offenses and prescribing penalties.

WHEREAS, a State of War exists between the United States of America and Japan, Germany, Italy and other Axis Powers, and the defense of the United States of America is in the hands of the Army and Navy;

WHEREAS, in modern warfare munition, however distant from the enemy, is free from attack; AND

WHEREAS, Lights at night time are a definite aid to the enemy in reaching military and other objectives; AND

WHEREAS, Blackouts, when ordered by the Army or Navy are essential to the preservation of life and property in this Borough, and it is imperative that the Borough of Patton aid the Army and Navy by all possible cooperation and assistance; AND

WHEREAS, Failure to extinguish lights when ordered to do so by duly authorized authorities may result in loss of life and property by the residents of the Borough of Patton as well as residents of other parts of the Nation when lights in this Borough are used as a guide to other objectives; AND

WHEREAS, Failure to comply with orders, rules and regulations governing evacuation, traffic movements, congregation of persons in streets and other places will result in confusion and unnecessary loss of life both during blackouts and during air raids in the daytime.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it enacted and ordained by the Borough of Patton in Council assembled and it is hereby enacted and ordained by authority of the same:

SECTION 1. That from and after the date of the approval of this Ordinance, the provisions hereof shall be and remain in full force and effect during the period of the emergency created by the War.

SECTION 2. AUTHORITY TO PROMULGATE NECESSARY ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR BLACKOUTS AND AIR RAIDS.—In order to protect life and property in the Borough of Patton from enemy action the Burgess is authorized and directed to carry out blackouts and air raid protection measures at such times and for such periods as are authorized or ordered by the Army or Navy and to promulgate such orders, rules, and regulations as may be necessary to insure the success of the blackouts and air raid protection measures and to protect life and property during said periods.

SECTION 3. AIR RAID AND BLACKOUT WARNINGS.—The term "Air Raid and Blackout Warning," as used in this ordinance shall mean a series of short intermittent blasts of the Clay Works whistle, for a duration of two minutes.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of every person who is in charge of an automobile or other motor vehicle when the air raid and blackout warning is given, to immediately pull over to the curb or roadside, and stop said vehicle and turn off all lights upon said vehicle, and also to shut off the motor leaving the key in said vehicle. In complying with the above provisions, it shall be the duty of every person in charge of said vehicle not to park the same in front of a fire exit, fire plug, Municipal Building entrance or at a street intersection, or to attempt to drive said vehicle while said lights are out. All of the above regulations must be complied with until the all clear signal is given.

SECTION 5. SPECIAL POLICE.—The Burgess may appoint for a specified time as many special police, without cost pay, from strongly residents of the Borough of Patton as may be deemed necessary for service in connection with any blackout or air raid protection measure. During the term of service of such special police, they shall possess all the powers and privileges and perform all the duties of the police officers of the Borough. Said special police must wear such identifying emblem as may be prescribed by the Burgess and it shall be unlawful for any said special policeman to attempt to carry out any order, rule or regulation promulgated under the authority conferred by this ordinance when he is not wearing said identifying emblem.

SECTION 6. UNAUTHORIZED WARNING OR ALL-CLEAR SIGNALS PROHIBITED.—Any unauthorized person who shall operate a siren or other device so as to simulate a blackout signal or air raid, or the terminations of a blackout or air raid, shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance.

SECTION 7. This ordinance is an exercise by the Borough of its governmental functions for the protection of the public peace, health and safety and neither the Borough of Patton, its agents and representatives, or any individual, receiver, firm, partnership, corporation, association, or trustee, or any of the agents thereof, in good faith carrying out, complying with or attempting to comply with, any order, rule, or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable for any damages sustained to persons or property as the result of said activity.

SECTION 8. Any light displayed contrary to any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance constitutes a public nuisance and when deemed necessary in order to protect life or property during a blackout or air raid the police, or the special police authorized herein, are authorized and directed to enter upon any premises within the Borough of Patton, using reasonable force, and to extinguish lights or to take other necessary action to make effective any order, rule or regulation promulgated under the authority conferred by this ordinance.

SECTION 9. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS SUSPENDED.—At all times within the order, rules and regulations made and promulgated pursuant to this ordinance shall be in effect, they shall supersede all existing ordinances, orders, rules and regulations insofar as the latter may be inconsistent herewith.

SECTION 10. PENALTIES.—Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance or any order, rule or regulation issued pursuant thereto shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or imprisonment for a period of not exceeding five (5) days in the Borough Lockup or in the

County Jail for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days, or by both fine and imprisonment.
