

**RECENT DEATHS IN NORTH OF COUNTY**

**MICHAEL KLAPAK**—Aged 46, of Spangler, died at 6 o'clock Sunday evening at his home after an illness of several years. Born in Slovakia on October 30, 1895, he was a son of Michael and Anna (Nadson) Klapak. Surviving are his mother, residing in Arcadia; his widow and seven children—Andrew Klapak, in the U. S. Army at Camp Stewart, Ga., Stephen Klapak, Spangler, Mrs. John Pollock, Ieslin, and Michael Elmer, Clyde and Elvina Klapak, all at home. A number of brothers and sisters also survive.

**JAMES A. PARRISH**—Funeral services for James A. Parrish, aged 82, a retired foreman of the Pennsylvania Railroad car shops at Cresson, were conducted on Monday morning in St. Aloysius' Catholic church at Summit with interment in the church cemetery.

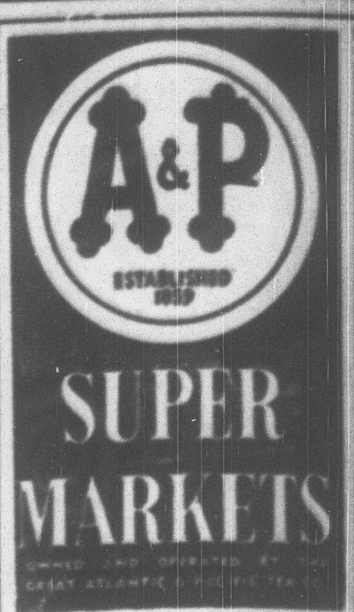
