BALLOT PRINTING CONTRACT GIVEN

Entering a low bid of \$145 per thousand, the Carrolltown News was awarded the contract Monday afternoon by the county commissioners for the printing of 120,000 ballots to be used in the general election of November 3. Weigel & Barber, Johnstown, entered a bid of \$7.60 per thousand while the Penn Printing Company, Johnstown, bid \$7.65 per thousand.

No bids were received for furnishing 185 boxes of election supplies. The commissioners will decide whether to readvertise for bids or to negotiate directly with election supply firms.
