## STATE-WIDE TIN CAN **COLLECTION LOOMING**

A new, state-wide tin can collection will be pushed as part of Pennsylvania's scrap drive, the state's advis-ory committee says.

The move was disclosed at a regional scrap institute of ten central counties called by the salvage committee.

Godfrey Wetterlow, the production board official, told the group that "tin is high on the list of needed metals." he said the program already was under way in many sections and predicted Pennsylvania would be the first state in the Union in tin can collections. Wetterlow said schools offered the best collection medium.

Ernest C. F. Greef of the WPB salvage and conservation division estimated the state's scrap harvest will yield 75,000 tons. "Your progress is good and I know it is going to gather steam," he said.
