There may be some teachers who still attempt to make left-handed children use their right hands.

Modern medical practice denounces this proceeding.

No left handed child should ever be trained to be right-handed.

Misconduct and nervous disorders in older children can be traced to attempts by parents or teachers to transfer left-handedness into right-handedness.

A certain number of persons are left-handed.

This is no disgrace any more than being born with red or sandy hair or being born short or tall, with blue eyes or black eyes.

It is important to find out early if the child is left-handed.

One can usually tell when he is six or eight months old.

If he always reaches for his bottle

or some object in front of him with his left hand, it is fairly certain he is left-handed.

No attempt should be made to correct him.

He should be permitted to reach with his left hand and things should be offered to his left hand rather than to his right hand.

The brain is organized to control motions of the hands.

Changing the use of hands cannot change the organization of the brain—it can only mix it up.

Before the left-handed child goes to school, it is a good idea to have his eyes examined.

An eye specialist can determine with which eye he sights.

This also has some bearing on behavior and nervous disorder.

Stuttering and other types of nervousness are often caused by attempts to rearrange a child's natural movements.

He should not be made to feel self-conscious.

To be left-handed will not become a handicap unless others treat it as such.

Many famous individuals have been left-handed.

**CRESSON NATIVE PRIEST NOW AT WASHINGTON U.**

Three members of the Franciscan community of Loretto and former professors at St. Francis College have been enrolled at Catholic University at Washington, D. C., for further education in their selected field.

**BUCKNELL, PENN STATE IN ANNUAL BATTLE SATURDAY**

One of Pennsylvania's oldest football rivalries will be resumed for the 52nd time Saturday when Bucknell University invades Penn State at the State College Stadium. The game is scheduled to begin at 2 p. m.

The Nittany Lions and the Bisons have met 31 times in the past, in a series which dates back to 1887. Over that period, Penn State has won 21 games, Bucknell has taken 10. The two teams have never tied.

State has won the last three of the games, but out of the past 12, Bucknell has scored seven upsets. Coach Higgins' team of Lions administered a 27-13 defeat to the Bisons last year.
