

MARTIN SAYS HE WILL HELP SERVICEMEN

Governor-elect Edward Martin, says he is determined to carry out his campaign pledge that "our boys do not tramp the streets when they come back." He says he is making preparations for the establishment of a post-war planning commission to arrange a broad peacetime job producing program.

The commission, which will be an active, fact-finding group to prepare a long-range policy will concentrate on:

- 1.—Highway construction and highway maintenance.
- 2.—Rehabilitation of flood-ravaged areas and protection against future high waters.
- 3.—Reforestation aimed at conser-

ving commonwealth woodlands and new tree cutting methods insuring a maximum economy.

4.—Marketing of excess farm products expected in the sharp post-war decline in demand for the state's agricultural commodities.

Martin's post war plan will revive a similar proposal advanced at last summer's special session by Representative Ellwood J. Turner, Republican, Delaware, but shunted aside despite his vigorous efforts to establish a legislative agency to study the problem.

Further, Martin plans to lay before a joint meeting of the State National Guard and Adjutant General Association in Harrisburg next April his ideas on post-war military needs. It was understood he will explain his position on establishments of veterans' bureaus to protect rights of soldiers returning from World War II.

ARMY RECRUIT LOSES LIFE AT SPANGLER

Death last Wednesday night cheated the Army of a new recruit when Frank Yablinsky, 24, of Bakerton, was found dead on a Spangler street, a victim of a hit and run motorist. Yablinsky had passed his physical examination and was scheduled to report to an induction center of the Army on Monday of this week.

Investigators say that Yablinsky was struck by two automobiles. Stanley F. Guier of Westover reported to Chief of Police Michael J. Whalen that his car had struck Yablinsky. He said he did not see the prostrate form of the man until his car had passed over the body. The skull and chest were crushed.

The investigation also revealed blood spots on the highway for a distance of 70 feet preceding the point where the Guier car had struck the body, indicating that another machine had been involved.

Frank Yablinsky was a son of John and Victoria Yablinsky and was born in Nanty-Glo on March 4, 1918. His mother died in 1935. The deceased had been employed at the Sterling Mine No. 6, at Elmora.

In addition to his father and a sister, Helen, in Cleveland, Ohio, he leaves the following brothers: Joseph, stationed with the U. S. Army at Ft. Jackson, S. C.; Henry and Felix, both of Patton; Charles, Bakerton, and John, at home. Frank Yablinsky was a member of the Sacred Heart Church and the Bakerton Local, No. 1269, United Mine Workers of America.

Funeral services were conducted on Saturday morning in the Sacred Heart Catholic Church by the Rev. Father Gerald Dugan. Interment was in St. Mary's cemetery at Nanty-Glo.
