RECENT DEATHS

Robert Bolsinger

Robert J. Bolsinger, 64, widely-known Ebensburg plumber and civic leader, collapsed and died at 7:50 o'clock on Monday night, a few minutes after arriving at the Twin Rocks School to do some work.

Mr. Bolsinger was conversing with Raymond Bradley, the school janitor, when he slumped to the floor dead. Dr. W. A. Prideaux of Twin Rocks was summoned and said death resulted from a heart attack.

One of Ebensburg's best-known residents, Mr. Bolsinger had been engaged in the plumbing business for 45 years. He was planning to work on Monday night at the school because the job could not be done when the children were attending classes. He had been in the building only a few minutes when he was stricken fatally. Coroner Patrick McDermott was informed.

A native and life-long resident of Ebensburg, Mr. Bolsinger was born Oct. 11, 1878, a son of Jesse and Irene (McCormick) Bolsinger. An active member of Ebensburg Presbyterian Church for many years, Mr. Bolsinger had served as a member of the board of trustees of the congregation.

He also served for several terms as a member of Ebensburg Boro Council. He was a member of the Ebensburg Council of Defense. Mr. Bolsinger, who was an active member of the Ebensburg Dauntless Fire Company for many years, had served as president of the organization for the last 16 years.

Surviving are his widow, the former Mary Grace Blair, whom he married Jan. 20, 1920; two brothers, Harry Bolsinger, Mt. Vernon, N. Y., and Milton Bolsinger, Johnstown, and a sister, Mrs. Sarah Jones, Baltimore, Md. He was preceded in death by three brothers, Edward, Walter and Raymond Bolsinger.

Jay Beattie

Jay Beattie, 12-year-old son of Edward W. and Helen (Campbell) Beattie, died on Monday afternoon at the parental home in Ebensburg, after an illness of acute lymphatic leukemia. He was taken ill last November and had been a patient in Mercy Hospital in Johnstown on four different occasions and had submitted to seven blood transfusions. Surviving are his parents and a brother and two sisters—Pvt. Edwin T. Beattie, stationed at Miami Beach, Fla.; Miss Ruth L. Beattie, Harrisburg, and Carol June Beattie at home. He was a student in the seventh grade of the Holy Name Parochial School.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning in the Holy Name Catholic Church, the requiem high mass was sung by the school choir. Interment was in the church cemetery under the direction of the Rosensteel Funeral Home.

Francis M. Dumm, 72, a retired employe of the Pennsylvania Railroad died at 6:45 o'clock last Saturday morning at the home of his brother, G. H. Dumm, of East Carroll township. 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


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Frank Capp.

PVT. JOHN J. YANUTA, OF COLVER SUFFERS FRACTURED LEG IN MINING

Pvt. John J. Yanuta of Colver, a member of the U. S. Army Reserve, has returned home to recuperate from injuries sustained while working in a molybdenum mine in Climax, Colo.

The soldier, who had been in the U. S. Army nearly 14 months, was released in November to take a vital job as a miner in the Colorado operations. The mining of molybdenum is considered as a vital war industry because the alloy is needed badly for war materials.

Upon consenting to enter the mines Pvt. Yanuta was placed in the U. S. Army Reserve. He is an experienced coal miner, having worked for seven

Because of his coal mining experience he was offered the mining job in Colorado, he said. He was inducted in the Army on Mar. 19, 1941.

The man suffered a broken leg on Feb. 9 when he was caught between a mine motor and a trap door. He returned home for a six-week furlough after spending nine weeks in a hospital.

He expects to return to the Climax mining operations at the expiration of his furlough.
