

TWO COUNTY MEN TO BE ORDAINED INTO PRIESTHOOD

At Ceremonies Next Saturday in the Altoona Cathedral, by Bishop Guilfoyle.

Two Cambria county young men will be levated to the priesthood at impressive ceremonies of ordination to be conducted on Saturday, May 8 in the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament in Altoona.

Most Rev. Richard T. Guilfoyle, D. D., bishop of the Altoona diocese, will officiate at the ceremonies which are scheduled to commence at 9:45 a. m.

The two men from the county are the Rev. Father Joseph Quinn, a native of Dunlo, and Rev. Father Linford Francis Greinader, of Twin Rocks.

Rev. Father Quinn was born in Dunlo, a son of James J. and Caroline (Trimer) Quinn, both deceased. He received his elementary education in the Dunlo public schools and was graduated from the Admas Township High School at Sidman.

The young priest attended St. Agnes' Academy at College Point, N. Y. and St. Charles' College, Catonsville, Md. He received his final clerical education at St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore.

Father Quinn is a nephew of the late Rev. Father George M. Quinn, former pastor at St. Patrick's Catholic church, Gallitzin, and Sister M. Trechmans, of the Sisters of the Visitation, Tacoma, Washington.

The new priest will sing his first mass at 10 a. m. next Sunday in St. Patrick's church, Gallitzin.

Father Greinader was born in St. Lawrence, the son of Francis and Coleda (Gill) Greinader. He received his early education in St. Michael's School, Hollidaysburg, and in the Big Bend School, Twin Rocks. His high school, college and seminary courses were taken at St. Francis College, Loretto. Rev. Father Charles W. Gallagher of Twin Rocks will be his sponsor at ordination.

The new priest will sing his first solemn mass in St. Charles Church, Twin Rocks, next Sunday. Rev. Father Charles W. Gallagher will serve as assisting priest; Rev. Father Charles Diamond, Loretto, will serve as deacon; Rev. Joseph Pier, Wilmore, sub-deacon, and Rev. Louis Donahue T. O. R., will preach the sermon.

SGT. LESNIAK, ASHVILLE DIES ON ARMY LEAVE

Funeral services for Staff Sgt. Leo L. Lesniak, who died at 9:45 o'clock on Sunday morning while on furlough at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Lesniak, of Ashville, were conducted this morning. A solemn high mass of requiem was celebrated in St. Thomas' Catholic Church and burial was in the church cemetery under the direction of W. A. Gibbons, Ashville mortician.

Sgt. Lesniak, who was presented the Air Medal for meritorious achievement on the Egyptian battlefield early this year, and who also holds the Distinguished Flying Cross, arrived home a week ago after spending many months on active combat duty in the Middle Eastern theatre of operations. He complained of a headache on the day he arrived home, and his condition became steadily worse until he died. Death was believed due to lobar pneumonia.

The young soldier enlisted in the Army Air Forces Jan. 2, 1942, and trained in Florida before being sent overseas. The War Department announced two weeks ago that he had been awarded the D. F. C. for completing 200 hours of combat flying. He was a member of St. Thomas' Catholic Church.

Three brothers are in the service. They are Sgt. Joseph W. Lesniak, stationed in Mississippi; Tech. Sgt. Louis J. Lesniak, in service seven years and serving overseas, and Pvt. Matthew Peter Lesniak, stationed in a camp in Georgia. Also surviving are his parents and four sisters—Mrs. Nellie Stock, Cresson; Mrs. Rose Letcher, Blandburg, and Mrs. Helen Sholtis, and Anna Marie, at home.
