Discussion of plans for the purchase of the Ebensburg Fair Grounds and conferring of citations upon two outstanding Cambria County educators.

Purchase of the fairgrounds, representing an investment of more than \$800,000, was discussed by the Legion as a means of establishing a permanent recreational center in the county.

In discussing plans for the purchase of the fairgrounds, which are among the largest and most elaborate in Pennsylvania, Legionnaires said that the fair would be continued after the present emergency.

During the meeting plans were advanced for the annual memorial services of the committee to be held on Sunday next in Rivoli Theatre, Ebensburg.

A parade will precede the community services. The parade will form at the Ebensburg court house at 1:30

p. m. and will traverse the principal streets of the town enroute to the theatre.

This year's memorial services, expected to be among the most elaborate, will be held in memory of the deceased veterans of World War II as well as those of the first World War.

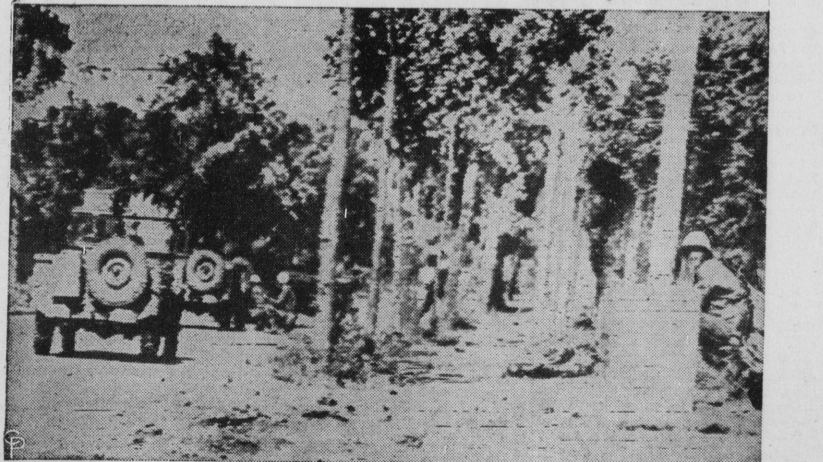
Names of deceased veterans of both wars will be read during the services.
