Cull Idle Hens.

Poultrymen must cull non-layers out of their flocks if the available feed supply is to do the most good in producing eggs. Extension specialists of the Pennsylvania State College say that careful, regular culling is not expected to reduce the number of eggs produced but will make nore feed available for the good layers and will cut down costs of production.

Feed Calf Starter.

To save milk for the war emergency many dairymen have adopted the dry calf starter method of feeding, report extension dairy specialists of the Pennsylvania State College. The secret in feeding dry starters is not to increase the milk above 2 or 2½ quarts twice daily each week.

Get Seed from Hay.

If the second crop clover hay was cut on the ripe side, there may be a lot of seed in it as well as good feed. Extension agronomists of the Pennsylvania State College say that if many of the heads rub out 15 to 20 seeds or more, it will pay to thresh the hay which will not hurt it for feeding.

Place Farm Labor.

# SAYS MILK PRODUCTION GRADUALLY INCREASING

Miles Horst, Pennsylvania Secretary of Agriculture, says that Pennsylvania milk production is gradually increasing in volume as more cows freshen, but added: "feed, labor and price conditions are such that many dairymen are fearful that even 1943 production may not be attained in 1944."

Horst said federal-state crop reporting service statistics show 1943 production of 4,863,000,000 pounds was three per cent below that of 1942 and that June was the only month in which production equalled that of the same month in the previous year. December production of 353,000,000 was three per cent under that of December 1942.
