NO METAL ICE BOX.

Production of pre-war models of all metal domestic ice refrigerators will not be resumed in the near future, the War Production Board said mainly because reversion would involve a long change-over period. The hard board and wood war model is now being produced at almost four times the pre-war rate.

BAGWORM PEST MORE PREVALENT IN STATE

What appears to be an increased number of bagworm sacs on ornamental trees in various parts of the state is reported by inspectors of the Bureau of Plant Industry in the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture.

This insect pest seems to prefer such evergreens as spruce, juniper and arborvitae, and such deciduous trees as maples, black locust and fruit trees, according to Dr. T. J. L. Guyton, director of the bureau.

The bagworm gets its name from the bag-like shelter that it builds in which to live. These bags are the over-wintering stage and are easy to recognize. They are grayish dark, about one and one-half to two inches long, tapered at each end. These bags are suspended from the smaller twigs of the infested tree. Inside of some are 200 or 300 eggs which will hatch in late spring. The worms that appear then will feed on the foliage of the tree on which they spent the winter.

Control of the insect is especially important on the evergreen trees, for once such trees are defoliated they will die, Dr. Guyton explains. Where only one or two rather small trees are infested, a good method of control is to remove and burn the over-wintering form, making certain that all bags are collected. The other method of control is to spray the trees, some time late in May, using one and a half pounds of lead arsenate in 50 gallons of water, or two level tablespoons to a gallon of water.

FARM MACHINERY.

Farm machinery production for the year beginning July 1st, will be about the same as for the current year, but the War Production Board warns that the recent schedules issued may be altered any time should schedules and circumstances demand such action. More than one million tons of carbon steel production is now tentatively earmarked for the American farmer.

DO YOU KNOW?

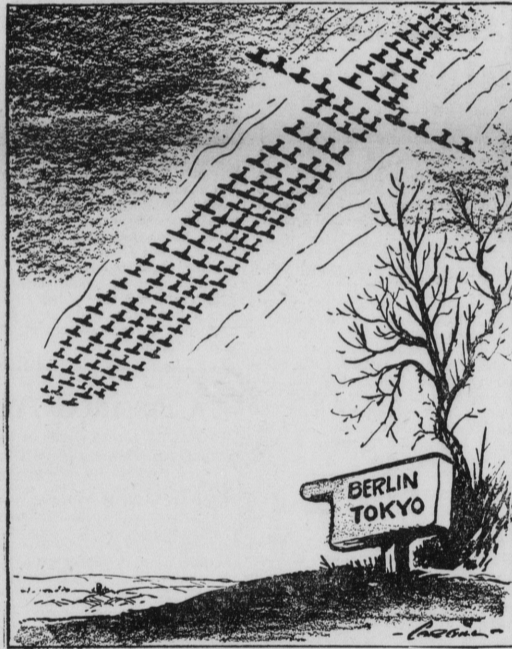
