NANTY-GLO GARAGE GUTTED BY FLAMES

Fire, following the explosion of a gasoline drum, last Wednesday night resulted in \$7,500 damage to the H. Dupstadt garage in Nanty-Glo. The town's volunteer firemen battled the blaze for an hour. William Sanderson, a member of the fire company, was slightly injured when he was struck by a hose line.

Two cars and a truck, the latter owned by A. A. Dietrick, hardware merchant, were damaged by the fire. Several other cars parked in the garage at the time, escaped damage.

Mr. Dupstadt was working on the gasoline drum when the explosion occurred. He said three young men were standing nearby and he expressed the belief that a spark from a cigaret may have ignited the gasoline fumes.

The garage building is owned by Mrs. Mary Himes of Nanty-Glo and had been renovated and painted during the past two weeks. A new vulcanizing plant, which had been installed only a week previous, was damaged extensively. Both Mrs. Himes and Mr. Dupstadt carried some insurance.

STATE TO ASSIST THE COUNTY IN FIGHT UPON THE JAPANESE BEETLES

The state agricultural department this week has under way an intensive battle against two of the worst enemies of Pennsylvania farmers—the gypsy moth and the Japanese beetle.

The department's Bureau of Plant Industry announcing it is placing seven thousand moth traps in northeastern counties in cooperation with the U. S. Agriculture Department's gypsy moth control division, and that it is opening the second phase of its Japanese beetle campaign in southeastern and western counties.

H. C. McWilliams, Cambria county farm agent, says that while some Japanese beetles were noted in the county last year few complaints of beetle activity had been received so far this summer. He added, however, that the beetles are just beginning to emerge from the grub stage at this season of the year and that increased prevalence may be noted later. McWilliams stated that an effective control preparation for the grubs can be made by mixing ten pounds of lead arsenate with 25 times that amount by volume, of sand, sifted soil or of ground limestone and scattering the mixture over the infested area.

Pilot Is Missing.
Lt. Kenneth P. Klemstine, 22, pilot of a B-24 Liberator bomber, has been reported missing in action in the European theatre since June 22, the war department notified his mother, Mrs. Eva Klemstine, of Cresson. The flier, who participated in the invasion of France, has been overseas since May. He was graduated from the Cresson high school and worked for the Lilly Boro Water Co. before joining the AAF. He is a brother of Staff Sgt. Julius Klemstine, also on duty with the armed forces in England, and Pvt. Harold, at Camp Davis, N. C.

Large Barn Burns.
Fire, which was started by children playing with matches, Monday evening destroyed the barn and two smaller buildings on the farm of John Vargo, located midway between Twin Rocks and Nanty-Glo. Approximately 40 chickens, 30 rabbits and a pig were cremated when the buildings burned to the ground.
