EBENSBURG DROPS TO HOLIDAYSBURG.
Hollidaysburg High took advantage of two Ebensburg fumbles at Ebensburg last Friday night to score a 13 to 6 win.

The first quarter was battled without a score, on even terms. In the second quarter, George Swalchick, right halfback for Ebensburg, intercepted a Hollidaysburg pass, and raced 60 yards to score the first touchdown and put the Cambria County gridders in the lead 6 to 0. Hollidaysburg drove back to Ebensburg's 6-inch line, before the half, but the Cambria County gridders repulsed the attack. Score, Ebensburg 6, Hollidaysburg 0.

In the third quarter, Ebensburg fumbled on Hollidaysburg's 6 yard line, with the Blair countyseaters recovering. On the next play Hollidaysburg fumbled and Ebensburg took over. Ebensburg then took its turn to fumble on the 1 inch line and on the next play Walker went over for the Hollidaysburg touchdown. Score: Ebensburg 6, Hollidaysburg 6.

In the final quarter Ebensburg fumbled on the Ebensburg 26 yard line with Hollidaysburg recovering. Walker then passed to Cummings, which was good for 23 yards. PORTAGE TOWNSHIP NOSES OUT SPANGLER.
Portage Township won its fifth straight game at Portage last Saturday when they blocked a punt in Spangler territory in the fourth quarter to beat out Spangler 12 to 7.

Eddie Wozniak, leading district scorer, added two more touchdowns to his credit.

In the first quarter Portage got a break when Salarczyk recovered a Spangler fumble on the Spangler 30, and Wozniak, on two plays, went over for a touchdown. Extra point failed. Spangler came back in the first quarter when they drove to the Portage Twp. 10 yard line. Clawson, on the receiving end of a pass, went over for the touchdown. Flanagan's placement kick was good, putting the Spangler lads out in front, 7 to 6.

With neither team scoring in the second and third periods, it looked like Spangler was on the way to break the Township's string. At this point, late in the fourth quarter, Portage Twp. blocked the Spangler punt and recovered on Spangler's 3-yard line. Wozniak went through center for the winning touchdown.
