SPANGLER HIGH SINKS PATTON—19-0.

Ernie Fronzo's Spangler High School Warriors drove for three touchdowns to defeat Patton High last Friday night at the Carrolltown Field.

The game had barely started when Lehmer went over for the first touchdown and Flanagan on a placement kick converted the extra point.

In the second quarter Patton made the only attempt to score, but were held on downs on the Spangler one-yard line, and Spangler took over.

In the third quarter Spangler intercepted a Patton aerial on the Patton 20 yard line. Lehmer then took the ball over for the second touchdown after receiving a pass from Dunchak.

After a march of 50 yards Dunchak went over for the final touchdown. Spangler plays at Nanty-Glo Saturday afternoon.

Carrolltown High succumbed before a powerful Altoona J. V. eleven last Friday afternoon at the Mansion Park Field by the score of 19 to 0.

Altoona scored after long drives in the first, second and final quarters. The strong Altoona line kept the Carrolltown team at bay and they were not able to present a serious threat at any time.

Scoring almost at will Blairsville swamped the Pine Twp. eleven at Blairsville on Saturday by the score of 75 to 6.

Pine Township scored in the second period for their lone touchdown.

Blairsville scored three touchdowns in the first quarter, one in the second, three in the third and four in the fourth quarters.

SPANGLER HIGH WINS OVER LILLY, 12 TO 6.

Spangler high school used a recovered fumble and long forward pass to score twice in the second quarter and defeat Lilly High, 12 to 6, at Spangler on Tuesday afternoon in a game postponed from Oct. 21 by bad weather.

Bob Westover, Spangler guard, snapped the scoreless deadlock when he snatched a fumbled ball in mid-air and galloped 35 yards for a touchdown. A short time later Kirkpatrick heaved a 35-yard pass to Right End White, who traveled another 30 yards to hit the end zone.

The Red Raiders avoided a white-wash in the last quarter when Tremel, the only substitute used by the visitors, took a punt and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown.

EBENSBURG HIGH WINS OVER INDIANA 12 TO 0.

Ebensburg High, scoring both touchdowns in the final quarter won over the Indiana High team at Indiana last Saturday afternoon by the score of 12 to 0.

In the first half the Indiana boys outplayed the Ebensburg team, racking up 7 first downs to Ebensburg's 1, with neither team scoring. Ebensburg started its scoring in the final quarter. A pass, Swalchick to Barber, good for 14 yards, moved the ball to Indiana's 4-yard line. Foust on his second attempt went over for the touchdown.

The second touchdown started from the Ebensburg 43-yard line and the march ended with Foust again taking the ball over from the 5-yard line. Foust, who was on the bench at the start of the game, performed brilliantly in the final quarter.

GALLITZIN HIGH TOPS HASTINGS, 19 TO 12.

In an interesting battle at Gallitzin on Saturday afternoon Gallitzin High came forth the winner over Hastings High by the score of 19 to 12.

In the first quarter Halfback P. Madie whipped a 30 yard pass to Santoni who went over for the first Gallitzin score. P. Madie went over on a plunge to convert the extra point.

In the third period P. Madie dupli-

cated his first period aerial and Santoni went over after receiving the pass on the Hastings 1-yard line.

In the final period P. Madie skirted right end for 12 yards to complete the scoring for Gallitzin.

Hastings scored both its touchdowns in the last quarter. Bills quarterback, hurled a 25-yard pass to redo, Halfback, who went over for the score. Hastings again drove came right back as Bills took the Gallitzin kick-off and raced 62 yards before being dragged down on the Gallitzin 3-yard line. Rutch plunged over the first score for Hastings. SPOTLIGHT NEWS AND COMMENT.

PATTON HIGH CLOSES FOOTBALL SEASON SATURDAY.

Patton High will put the lid on the 1944 football season on Saturday when they travel to Lilly to play Lilly high school.

Lilly High School has one of the youngest coaching combinations in the entire state. The coaching combination consists of the 18-year-old Andy Chobany, former Portage High School griddler and a freshman at Penn State last year and Francis Augusta, former Lilly high school player.

Chobany at the end of his first year at Penn State, enlisted in the Merchant Marines and is awaiting his call to officers' training school at that branch of the service.

Not much can be said of the success of the Lilly team so far this season. They have lost the following games to: Portage Twp., 20-0; Gallitzin, 12-7; Bellwood, 47-0; Cresson, 13-7; Johnstown "B", 19-7; and they won over Nanty-Glo, 7 to 0.

A great battle is expected and Patton is hoping to close the season with a victory.

CAGE LEAGUE MAPS SCHEDULE.

At a meeting last Thursday evening in the Conemaugh High School, D. G. Seese, principal of the Franklin High School, was elected to head the West Central Cage League for the coming 1944-45 season.

The Franklin Blue Jays won the league last year and went on to win the District 6 title. Competing for the state championship they were dropped from the running in the Western Region semi-finals by Duquesne High School.

The following schools will compete in the league which gets under way on Jan. 2—Portage, South Fork, Nanty-Glo, Adams Twp., and Franklin High Schools.

HUNTING SEASON

Pennsylvania hunters and trappers who took to the woods in earnest on November 1st, are asked by the state game commission to "save as much fat from the fur-bearing animals as possible" for the war effort.

This campaign was first undertaken in 1942 at the War Production Board's request, when 94 tons of wild animal fats were salvaged. Last year the collection exceeded the 1942 figure.

Small game hunting season which opened on Nov. 1st, will continue through Nov. 30th. The bear season will run four days, from Nov. 27th to Nov. 30th inclusive, and the deer season from Dec. 1st to 16th inclusive. Last year's low kill will make 1944 a banner year for this state's war reduced hunting army.

Trapping for minks, skunks and otters will be legal from Nov. 1 to Feb. 1. Muskrats from Dec. 1, to Feb. 1. Beaver from Feb. 15 to March 1. The opossum is legal prey throughout the year. According to the director of the game commission, Seth Gordon, mink will be rather scarce, but muskrat and skunk should be found in abundance.

Billy Southworth, manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, who won the World series over the Browns, had his team play the final games of the series in long underwear. Well, that was one way of steaming them up.

Boswell High School is without a single point in five straight contests this year, while South Fork High has landed but two touchdowns to date, each one producing a victory. They defeated Beaverdale and Patton High by the identical scores of 7 to 6.

Eddie Wozniak, Portage township high school's star performer, happens to be a transfer student to Portage high. His eligibility was questioned a few weeks ago but he was found to be perfectly O. K. by the district No. 6 Board in Altoona.

Marine trainees have played their last game for Penn State. The marine unit has been disbanded at State College, depriving the Lions of their main source of war-time athletic material.

Ensign Wilfred Sutton, Munster, Pa., Cresson high school graduate in 1932, and former track man at Penn State, was high scorer in the Philadelphia independent basketball league last season. Ensign Sutton's brother, Raymond, is a resident of Patton. Incidentally, the Sutton brothers, including Wilfred, who is 6 ft. 5 in. in height, Raymond and his three other brothers, had a basketball team in one family, called the Suttons. They played independently in the past years around Cresson and Loretto. They are well known to St. Francis College, helping the college teams in many of their workouts.

SPORT PICK-UPS.

Johnny Chuckran, a freshman at Penn State, has been named to captain the State's football team in the coming game with Colgate. Chuckran who plays the tailback position, is the first freshman in the school's history to captain a varsity football team.
