Miss Anna Gresko. Funeral services for Miss Anna Gresko, of Patton, who died Thursday night, were conducted at two o'clock on Monday afternoon in SS. Peter and Paul's Russian Orthodox Church, in Patton, and interment was made in the church cemetery. Miss Gresko expired at the Spangler hospital where she had been a patient since Jan. 27. The deceased was born in Beaverdale on March 19, 1909, a daughter of George and Mary (Mayernick) Gresko. HALUSKA TELLS SENATE OF COUNTY ROADS

The Senate heard of some of the difficulties of travel due to snow conditions and a demand that the State Highway Dept. do something about it.

Sen. John J. Haluska (D.-Cambria) said on his return from Harrisburg after last week's Senate session he traveled 138 miles requiring three days, to go 17 miles from Altoona to his home in Patton and coming to Harrisburg today he traveled 111 miles from Patton to Altoona.

"Something ought to be done for the highways in my county," Haluska told the Senate. "I'm not trying to blame anyone—the Administration or the highway department."


Haluska renewed a demand for action on a resolution submitted by himself and Sen. John J. Dent (D.-Westmoreland) to ask Secretary of Highways John U. Schroyer to appear before the Senate highways committee on the winter's road troubles.

Sen. A. H. Letzler (R.-Clearfield) replying to Haluska, said, "all the senators are experiencing the same weather conditions in their counties," and that he had found Schroyer "very cooperative." He said he felt sure Schroyer would be glad to sit down with the committee and discuss the situation."

CENSUS BUREAU SETS POPULATION AT 138,100,874

The Census Bureau at Washington last week set the nation's population including military personnel overseas, at 138,100,874, as of July 1, of last year, an increase of 1,600,000 over the previous year. Of the total, women outnumbered
