

GABLES ANNOUNCE ANNUAL FARM SHOW

October 17 to 19 Dates Set by Altoona Department Store; Prizes to Be Awarded

On October 17, in the 12th Ave. Building of the William F. Gable Co., Altoona, the Central Pennsylvania Farm Products Show will be opened, and there will be a large number of interesting exhibits.

Exhibits may be entered Oct. 16, from 12 noon to 10 p. m. The exhibit, which is sponsored by the Altoona Chamber of Commerce, is to be in charge of the Agricultural Committee, consisting of W. Stanley Truby, chairman; George Hasler, John Isenberg and Harry T. Keiss, acting county farm agents.

The show will be opened daily until Oct. 19, inclusive, from 9 a. m. until 9 p. m. and admission will be free to all. A new feature of this year's show will be exhibits of stuffed wild birds and animals, for which a prize will be given for the largest number of varieties, only one of a kind being permitted.

The show will be conducted under the following rules and regulations:

- Competition is open to Blair and adjoining counties.
- All exhibits are entered free.
- Entries may be made Tuesday, Oct. 16, from 12 noon to 10 p. m.
- Judging will be done on Wednesday, Oct. 17, beginning at 9 a. m.
- Show will be open to the public Wednesday noon, Oct. 17.
- Exhibitors may remove their exhibits after 9 p. m. Friday, Oct. 19, or anytime before 6 p. m. Saturday, Oct. 20. Exhibits not removed will be disposed of by the committee.
- Exhibits shall be the absolute product of work of the exhibitors.
- The exhibitors may make more than one entry in a class, but are entitled to only one award in any one class or sub-class.
- The management will make every effort to safeguard exhibits, but will not be responsible for any damage or losses beyond their control.
- Exhibitors must use entry cards for each exhibit.
- If exhibits are improperly entered, they may be reclassified by the judge.
- First, second and third prizes will be awarded in all listed classes.
- In classes where no competition exists, the judge may award a lower than first prize.
- If the exhibits lack in quality, the judge may award a second, third or give no prize.
- The decision of the judges shall be final, except where error is found after awards have been made. In such cases, the decision of the show committee shall be final.
- All premiums will be paid by check. These checks must be presented for payment within 30 days from the issued date.
- \$500 in cash prizes and \$150 in War Bonds has been posted by the Wm. F. Gable Co. for competing exhibitors. Ribbons for first, second and third places will also be awarded. PRISON INDUSTRY NEARING NORMAL

A rapid return to normal peacetime production in Pennsylvania's prison industries—hampered for the past several months by war contract cancellations and raw material shortages—was predicted in the past week by the State Welfare Department.

Explaining that supplies were obtained through federal government and commercial channels much sooner than was expected, the department estimated that production commonwealth institutions was more than 80 per cent of normal.

F. Herbert Cooper, acting director of the prison labor division, was confident that reconversion could be completed within a few months.

"The situation has improved," he said. "All of our industries have opened up surprisingly in the past month. We're getting materials we hadn't expected would be obtainable for two to three months."

The director added that as soon as existing programs were operating at capacity the commonwealth would expand training and install new industries "in the hope that we can improve the rehabilitation of Pennsylvania prisoners."

TWELVE VETS ENLIST FOR COURSES AT THE ST FRANCIS COLLEGE

60 Students Already Registered As More Enrollments Are Still Being Expected

Twelve discharged servicemen are taking courses at St. Francis College, Loretto, this year it has been revealed by the director of public relations of that school, Rev. Leonard P. Sardo, T. O. R.

Registrations are still expected at the school, as 60 have already enrolled in the collegiate courses. Registrars remark that they are willing to accept late registrants who have delayed making up their minds about going to college.

According to the latest computations of the registrars there are now 20 Freshmen, 17 Sophomores, 10 Juniors, 8 Seniors and 5 Special Students. Forty-two of these will live on the campus divided into five cottages that provide the home atmosphere greatly desired by students. Seventeen of the men desire to commute daily from their homes in nearby towns.

So far, there are 29 students in the college school of civinity, 12 in teacher's training, 10 in pre-medical, two in pre-law, two in dentistry, one in pharmacy, one in civil engineering and two in arts.

Teacher-advisers are on hand to assist the students who register in their departments that proper courses would be taken according to their wants.
