5 POLIO CASES ALL REPORTED IN COUNTY

As of Nov. 10, this county had reported five cases of poliomyelitis in 1945, compared with 58 cases for the same period of 1944, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has disclosed.

Emergency aid sent to the state by the foundation in 1945 totaled \$4,251, it was said. Of the total, Cambria County received \$22,500, including a loan of \$15,000 last June and a second grant of \$7,500 forwarded this month.

RESTAURANT LICENSES BEING ISSUED UNDER NEW LAW RECENTLY PASSED

Restaurant licenses are now being issued by the State Department of Health under the new legislation regulating the conduct and operation of public eating and drinking places within the state.

The Restaurant Sanitation Law was passed by the 1945 Session of the Pennsylvania Legislature and became effective when it was signed by Gov. Martin May 23, 1945.

The licensing section of the Act states that "from and after a period of six months after the effective date of this act, it shall be unlawful for any proprietor to conduct or operate a public eating or drinking place without first obtaining a license, as herein provided."

Dr. Harry Weast, secretary of the department, said that it was an impossibility to mail all of the licenses before last Friday, the date the act went into effect, but that the proprietors of public eating and drinking places may continue to


operate their establishments if they have been inspected and approved by a state sanitarian. Over 1,500 licenses have already been posted.

COMMITTEE EXAMINING GAME, FISH COMMISSIONS

The examination of affairs and procedures of the State Fish and Game Commissions in the light of criticism in sportsmen's circles all over the state is under way by a commission of 11 members of the

state legislature. The committee, among whom is Frank J. Pentrack of Johnstown, already have conferred with Seth Gordon, executive director of the Game Commission, and with C. A. French of the bureau of fisheries for the purpose of affecting improvements in organization and operation.

Conferences are planned with the leaders of various sportsmen's groups in the near future to receive suggestions for improving the administration of the game and fish laws to give sportsmen maximum benefits.
