NO END SEEN SOON FOR TIRE RATIONING
Automobile drivers, as well as drivers of commercial vehicles, are warned by the Office of Price Administration that the end of tire rationing is not in sight.

The Altoona office says that the latest indications are that rationing of tires probably will not end for several months, despite rumors and reports that the first of the year would see an end to the regulations.

OPA officials said they had just been advised that this month's quota of truck tires will be 50,000 less than November's quota, and urged motorists to be as careful of their tires as possible.

VETS URGED TO VISIT U. S. REVENUE OFFICE

Returning veterans of World War II are advised by Ronald F. McCormick, deputy collector of internal revenue, to include a visit to the revenue office in their district in their schedule of "things to do" in making readjustments to civilian life.

By calling at the office, he said, the vet can clear up any problems regarding his income tax in preparation for filing a return during the usual tax-filing period from Jan. 1 to Mar. 15. And in some cases, he added, the visit might even prove profitable to the veteran as some servicemen are entitled to refunds on their 1942 income tax.

For the benefit of returning servicemen McCormick explained that the first \$1,500 of service pay is excluded from taxable income for the years 1943, 1944 and 1945. Included in service pay are regular monthly payments, overseas pay, flying pay, longevity pay and extra pay for submarine service.

In computing his service pay, however, a veteran doesn't include government family allotments, or travel or uniform allowances or any veterans pension money.

"Many returning servicemen and women," Mr. McCormick said, "are under the impression that they owe income tax on money, whereas there are numerous cases in which refunds are due."

"If a veteran has any question at all about income tax," the deputy collector said, "he should stop in at the revenue office."

COUNTY DAIRYMEN LAUDED BY STATE

Dairymen of the county have been praised by Dr. C. P. Bishop, of the Agriculture Extension Office, on the results of the tuberculosis test conducted in Cambria during the past summer.

A phenomenal showing, said Dr. Bishop, was reported in the fact that after a period of six years only one reactor was found in the entire county, where 2,849 herds including 13,369 cattle, were tested. In 1939 when the last tuberculosis tests were made, 13,695 cattle were tested, 326 more than in the 1943 test.

According to Dr. Bishop's statement the results of the test make Cambria County an accredited tuberculosis area until April, 1951.

BIG GLASS FACTORY PLANNED AT TYRONE

Industrial expansion announced by the State Department of Commerce includes the construction of a \$3,000,000 glass plant at Tyrone. The Corning Glass Co. of Corning, N. Y., has acquired the athletic park site at Tyrone and has ordered plans for the buildings. The plant will manufacture silica products, utilizing the native limestone of Bald Eagle Valley, pottery clay and glass sand. It will provide employment for about 1,000 persons.

VOTE TO STRIKE TO GET DEMANDS

Johnstown steel workers Wednesday of last week voted by a five to one majority to go out on strike if it was necessary to enforce demands for a \$2-a-day wage hike.

Balloting in the greatest mass strike vote in the city's colorful industrial labor history, the workers in the five steel plants by a margin of 7,529 to 1,544 registered their support to the pay increase drive of the United Steel Workers of America.

Hailing the wide majority as a vote of confidence to the union's wage fight, District Director Daniel W. Siskel has emphasized that the election's outcome does not necessarily mean an industrial walkout, and cautioned against wildcat strikes. Further action in any strike will come from President Philip Murray, the union's wage policy committee and the international officers.
