BOXING PLANNED BY AREA LEGIONS

The Cambria County American Legion Recreational Assn., whose chairman is Frank Burke of St. Michael, a one-time boxing manager, is losing no time in going into action on sports programs.
Mr. Burke has announced that plans are already underway to hold amateur boxing shows twice each month, with an eye towards the promotion of professional shows.
The association recently completed negotiations for the purchase of the Ebensburg Fairgrounds, at which place the proposed bouts will be held.
The first show, which is to include 12 or 15 bouts, is tentatively scheduled for the last part of April in the Arena, with outdoor programs staged as soon as weather conditions permit.
Mr. Burke has been assured of the cooperation of all the Legion posts in the county in getting the project under way and helping to maintain it. It is also the plan of the association to make the Fairgrounds a training site for professional fighters as soon as necessary repairs can be made.
Several managers of amateur boxers already contacted have evidenced great enthusiasm in the program, Burke said.
The Fairgrounds Arena will seat 5,000 comfortably for a boxing show with few renovations. For the outdoor shows, a ring will be put in front of the grandstand and ring-side seats constructed on all four sides to accommodate 5,000 to 6,000 persons.
