Eight Teams in League Eight teams comprised the league, with the group opposing the American Assn. and the National League. The Union Assn. League disbanded after 2 years due to the lack of financial support.

The editor, Walt Tulley, records the origin of baseball and gives a history of the game, the first baseball organizations, the major league history from 1871 to date, and the all-time championship records.

PITTSBURGH PIRATES NOW SIXTY YEARS IN NATIONAL LEAGUE

The Pittsburgh Pirates have been members of the National League for 60 consecutive years, and in that time have set quite a record as baseball goes.

In 59 Pennant Races: First place, 6 times; second place, 11 times and tied once; fourth place, 12 times; fifth place, six times; sixth place, six times; seventh place, four times and eighth place, five times.

They were world champions in 1909 and 1925, and National League champions in 1901, 02, 03, 09, 25 and 27.

The club finished in the first division in 37 of the past 46 years.

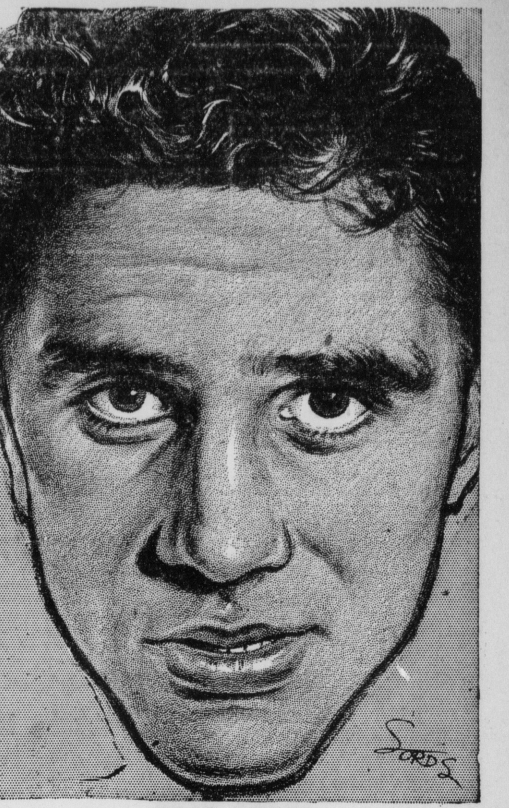
