Fifteen members were admitted to the local Catholic War Veterans Post at a meeting Monday evening in St. Bernard's Hall. Membership in the organization now totals 50. Signatures of charter members will be affixed to the charter at a meeting Friday of next week, Aug. 30.

The War Dept. interprets the GI terminal leave law to mean that delays enroute—such as stopovers at home when transferred from one camp to another—count as furlough time.

The terminal leave payment is based on the pay the soldier was receiving at the time of discharge. The amount of the terminal leave base pay raise do not benefit by it.

The old and new base pay scales follow: Private, \$50 and \$75; private first class, \$54 and \$80; corporal, \$66 and \$90; sergeant, \$78 and \$100; staff sergeant, \$96 and \$115; technical sergeant, \$114 and \$135; and master and first sergeant, \$128 and \$165.

Will Get Substantive Money

When an enlisted man gets a furlough he is given a subsistence allowance amounting to what it will cost the Army to feed him when he is on duty. Each fiscal year this figure is fixed according to food prices that year. For this fiscal year it is 68 cents a day—the terminal leave bill allowing 70 cents.

The upper three grades in each service are allowed \$1.25 per day for quarters provided they had dependents when discharged.
