FARMING IS DANGEROUS OCCUPATION REPORTS OF MAJOR INDUSTRIES SHOW

Farming is dangerous!

More accidental deaths occurred in agriculture last year than in any of the other five major industrial groups.

A total of 4,300 deaths, or about 25 percent of all occupational fatilities, were those of farmers or ranchers killed at work.

In addition, there were 900,000

person fell off some piece of farm equipment.

There were also falls from haymows, buildings, stairs and horses—from ladders, scaffolds and trees.

Accidents attributed to farm machinery caused the second highest number of deaths.

The farmer handles machinery as powerful as many other industrial machines, and he handles this machinery over rough ground. Seldom are there safety devices on farm machinery, and the farmer is almost constantly exposed to danger.

Livestock causes the third largest number of fatal accidents on the farm.

Falling trees, burns and sharp tools cause accidental deaths on farms.

Most industries have reduced their accident rate by eliminating hazards and by educating their employes in safety measures.

This is not true of the farming industry.

ENGLAND'S RFFORESTING England has a post-war refor-estation program which will pro-vide full empolyment for 50,000 men, according to records receiv-ed by the Department of Forests and Waters.

Careless smokers and campers start 30 per cent of all man-made fires, according to State Depart-ment of Forest and Waters offi-cials.
