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Bridge at Gallitzin Declared 'Unsafe'

First Capitol Building

The old two-span Jackson St. bridge in Gallitzin, one that crosses the mainline railroad tracks near the mouth of the Gallitzin tunnel, has been closed by the PUC as being "inadequate and unsafe."

The closing of the bridge resulted from testimony given at a PUC hearing last week as action was taken by the Borough Council to have the Pennsylvania Railroad Co. repair the structure. It was contended "a traffic hazard."

One span of the bridge was built in 1898, the other in 1902. Motor traffic between the two parts of the town now is being routed over two detours.

The size of the original capitol building of the United States was 332 feet 4 inches in length and 229 feet in depth. It was built of aquia, Virginia sandstone, secured from quarries the United States owned.
